Supporting NHS Test and Trace

You may be wondering why we are asking for consent to record your name and telephone number when you come to church. We hope this notice answers your questions. It has been produced by the Church of England to explain how information about you will be used temporarily by the Parochial Church Council (PCC) during the Covid-19 pandemic crisis so we can put in place a list of clergy, staff and visitors to the church building/s, as requested by the Government in support of NHS Test and Trace.

1. Who we are

St Saviour's PCC are the data controller (contact details in section 7. below). This means we decide how your personal data is used and why.

2. The information we collect about you and why we need it

Although we may have your contact details already for our usual work the Covid-19 pandemic has created a unique situation and additional reasons for us to collect the name and contact telephone numbers of all clergy, staff and visitors who visit/use our church building/s in order to support NHS Test and Trace. This is specifically in relation to contact tracing, which is the process of identifying, assessing, and managing people who have been exposed to a disease to prevent onward transmission and the investigation of local outbreaks.

For more information about Test and Trace, and how they will use your personal details, please see the Government guidance website: <https://www.gov.uk/guidance/nhs-test-and-trace-how-it-works>

In summary, Test and Trace:

- provides testing for anyone who has symptoms of coronavirus to find out if they have the virus;
- gets in touch with anyone who has had a positive test result to help them share information about any close recent contacts they have had; and
- alerts those contacts, where necessary, and notifies them they need to self-isolate to help stop the spread of the virus.

This is voluntary, and you don't have to provide your details, however, if you do, they will only be used for the purpose of sharing them with NHS Test and Trace.

3. Lawful basis

We will use your information lawfully, as explained below:

Consent – We need your consent in order to collect your name and contact telephone number and share this with NHS Test and Trace if requested. You will give us your consent by providing your details in the List/Form.

Explicit consent – We need your explicit written consent to collect your data on the basis that you may have revealed a religious belief by using our church building/s. You will give us your explicit consent by completing the List/Form.

You can withdraw your consent at any time after giving your details by letting us know you no longer want us to keep or share your personal data for this purpose, however, once we have given your details to Test and Trace we will no longer be able to prevent processing. To contact us, please see our contact details at 7. below.

4. Sharing your data

Your personal data will be treated as strictly confidential and will only be shared with NHS Test and Trace if requested.

Personal data that is collected will be used only to share with NHS Test and Trace. It will only be used for the purpose specified in this Privacy Notice.

5. Data Retention

We will keep your name and telephone number for a maximum of 21 days and will dispose of it after this period.

6. Your Legal Rights

Unless subject to an exemption under the GDPR or DPA 2018, you have the following rights with respect to your personal data: -

The right to be informed about any data we hold about you;

The right to request a copy of your personal data which we hold about you;

The right to withdraw your consent at any time, while the [*name of church body*] still has your data;

The right to request that we correct any personal data if it is found to be inaccurate or out of date;

The right to request your personal data is erased where it is no longer necessary for us to retain such data;

The right, where there is a dispute in relation to the accuracy or processing of your personal data, to request a restriction is placed on further processing;

The right to obtain and reuse your personal data to move, copy or transfer it from one IT system to another. [*only applicable for data held online*]

7. Complaints and queries

If you have any questions about this privacy notice, including any requests to exercise your legal rights, please contact Mother Karen on 01843 216357.

Church Open!

We are delighted that St Saviour's Church is now open to everyone for private prayer on weekdays and Saturdays between 10am and 12noon.

There will always be two people in church to greet you and remind you of the guidelines to keep us all safe. The aim is to make you feel welcome without being over zealous.

You will be asked to use the hand sanitiser as you enter the church and then be invited to sit in the north aisle for silent prayer or just to enjoy the stillness. We have Taizé music playing in the background as an aid to prayer and you are welcome to light a candle. However, please do not do so immediately after using the sanitiser.

Unfortunately, we are unable to provide toilet facilities or any form of refreshment.

Mother Karen, Chrissy and I are very grateful to everyone who has made it possible for us to open the church and for carrying out the extra cleaning that is so important during the present time.

Following the welcome announcement allowing public worship again, we are planning to resume our services at 8am and 10.30am from Sunday 5th July. We do not know all the changes that will be necessary for these services to go ahead because, at the time of writing (28th June), we are waiting for further guidance from the Government via Bishop Rose.

As can be seen, there has been a turnaround in our finances this month which for the first time this year show a surplus. This has had the effect of reducing the accruing deficit as shown. The reason for the turnaround is due to some generous donations and a catch up of regular giving now our church is open for worship.

The Storehouse (Foodbank) is now able to accept donations of food on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. However, the Storehouse will accept monetary donations and the church will continue to act as a focal point for receiving such donations. A total of £1385 at 31 July 2020 has been sent to the Storehouse.

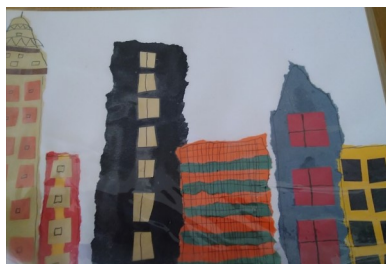
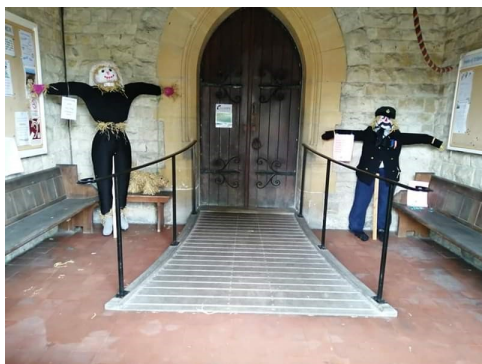

Westgate-on-Sea Heritage Centre by Dr Dawn Crouch

The Heritage Centre has continued to function although, at present, we are still unable to hold any meetings. The church is now open each morning from 10.00 a.m. to 12 noon, but again, at present, we cannot have material on display.

Last month, I expressed the hope that, somehow, it would be possible to mark the centenary on **Saturday 11th July** of the erection of the War Memorial tablet to those who died in the Great War. I am so pleased to say that it was possible to do this, albeit in a very low-key “ceremony”. Christine Attwood, our membership Secretary and Churchwarden and I, as Churchwarden Emeritus and Hon Freeman of Westgate-on-Sea lit candles on that day, keeping socially distanced. The lovely oak frame of the tablet is almost six feet in length, so we were able, after lighting our candles separately, to stand either side of it to have a “historic” photograph taken for the records. It was my first “outing” since mid-March and I’m very grateful to my good friend Colin, also a Heritage Centre member who, with his wife Elsie, has agreed to provide a “bubble” for me until such time as there is further relaxation of “rules”. Colin was also the photographer.

I have continued to answer inquiries from many people on a variety of Westgate related topics and a monthly newsletter has again been issued for our members.

Some of you will have seen the **scarecrows in the town on 18th and 19th July** and some may have followed the Festival trail. It was so good that Heritage Centre members were able to respond to that as well, to keep both the Centre and St Saviour’s Church on the map. It was not easy to make them under the circumstances - finding the right materials, when it was not possible just to pop into a charity shop to see what they had, proved a challenge which was admirably met. We thank most sincerely Valerie Lamb who made the “Military Man” scarecrow, based on her Uncle Harold, which stood by the gate in St Mildred’s Road and the four members of the Neve family, all Heritage Centre members, who made the amusing scarecrow (plus well-known dog) which stood in Westgate Bay Avenue near the north entrance to the church. Both took a long time to make and the creators bothered to be around to welcome the public and talk about their models.

The next important anniversary is the **15th August**, the 75th anniversary of VJ Day. We shall try to see that it is marked. It is very fitting that today, in the troubled world in which we are living, that we remember the men who fought and died in the Far East - the forgotten army, for whom VE Day and its celebrations had left them, so far away, feeling that they were out of sight and out of mind. Many Westgate men fought in the Far East. Some, including Colin Hambidge and Frederick Clark, died there in notorious Japanese POW camps. May their souls rest in peace!

On 15th August, therefore, let us all remember the Kohima Epitaph, which has come to be associated with those who lost their lives and are buried “in some corner of a foreign field” - so very far from home.

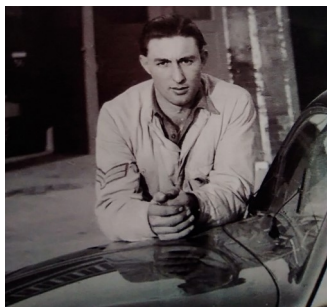

An eventful two years of National Service : 1951-1953:-

My late father, Herbert John Acres (22/06/33-20/07/17), was conscripted into National Service, just after his 18th birthday in 1951, to serve in one of the armed forces. He joined the 1st Battalion Irish Guards (He was not of Irish descent, but was probably chosen because of his height, as he stood well over 6 ft!). After an initial period of training at Pirbright, Surrey, he left for Llanelly Barracks, Hubbelrath, Dusseldorf, Germany, where he served most of his National Service. It was here that he soon obtained his driving licence, and started driving lorries on behalf of the army. It was at this point, that he realised that he had to learn some vital words of German, to enable him to reach his destinations! Father Michael Casey (later to become Canon Casey), served as Padre to the battalion during this period, and made a profound impression on my father. My father, by now a corporal, would help Father Casey set up a makeshift altar on the back of his lorry during manoeuvres, and recalls being moved by the sight of German civilians kneeling and praying in the fields with the British soldiers. My father was deeply attached to this kind man, finding him sociable, amiable, understanding, approachable, and a very good listener.

The battalion returned three times to England during this period for major Royal occasions: the funeral of King George the Sixth in February 1952 ; the funeral of Queen Mary in March 1953, and the Coronation of our present Queen in June 1953. The Irish Guards travelled soon after this to Ulster for a recruiting drive, and it was at Stormont Castle, Belfast, that a Guard of Honour was formed for the young Queen by the battalion. The Queen and Prince Philip were visiting the province at that time. Many years later when we looked at souvenir books or Pathe films of these royal occasions, my father could show us exactly where he was standing! Our contact with the regiment still lasts today, and we, as a family have been very much involved with the Irish Guards Association (London). My father's pride was evident when in the mid-1990's at Chelsea Barracks, my youngest son, Michael (then 4 years old), presented the Queen Mother with a small bouquet of flowers! The Queen Mother was there to present shamrock to the guardsman for St. Patrick's Day. Love from Valerie.

The Feast of the Transfiguration - 6th August

For thirty years in Westgate the Feast of the Transfiguration - 6th August - was more than just another of the great festivals of the Christian church and everyone looked forward to it with great pleasure. When the Revd Stanley Evans came to St Saviour's in 1972 his one disappointment was that his new parish had no "Feast of Tittle", because it was not named after a saint, but after our Saviour himself. He thought hard about this as most of the great days connected with our Lord were already major Feast Days such as Christmas or Easter. Then his mind alighted on 6th August, one of the great festival days of the Christina church and so that date was adopted for St Saviour's "Patronal" Festival. It was two weeks after the anniversary of the dedication of St Saviour's on 23rd July 1884, so it could mean two weeks of unbridled festivity in what then was still the heart of the season.

For two weeks at the end of July and the beginning of August, St Saviour's was decked in white and gold and played host to its neighbours and friends of all denominations and to the representatives of local organisations and civic authorities. Bishops and Archdeacons, active or retired, were booked months in advance to preach. Those who did the flowers started to plan their schemes and fete stall holders began to collect together their goods for sale.

In addition to the special services, events included the Summer Fair and the annual tea-party in the vicarage gardens - does anyone else remember the jardinière which was used to collect donations? I think it might currently reside in the ringing chamber, as Stanley had nowhere to put in his new home when he retired. Each year there was a wonderful evening in the vicarage garden when we enjoyed music and poetry performed by the Marsare Chorale - and superb refreshments provided by Marie's "ladies" in the interval. As we are still producing the Link online and have more space we are including some photographs of those days - which seem so far off now.

However, 6th August is also a day of more sobering memories. It is one of the days when we try to make sure that the chandelier in the Memorial Chapel is lit as we remember Lt Christopher Moor, in whose memory it was given. He "passed into light", as the inscription reads, on 6th August 1915 when he was shot to pieces on the Turkish ramparts in Gallipoli.

As it is lit this year and we remember all those who have died in the cause of freedom and justice, we should also not lose sight of that date as the anniversary of one of the most horrific and terrifying events in our own times - for me and my contemporaries, our lifetimes - the dropping of the first atomic bomb on Hiroshima on 6th August 1945. As an impressionable teenager, I remember the day after that event, when we read about it in the newspapers and heard about it on the radio.

We did not understand then just how it would colour our lives for so many years ahead. It is not for me to speak of the rights and wrongs of such an event - I do know that at the time, there was little condemnation. News of the atrocities being perpetrated in Japanese POW camps were leaking out. Thousands of men were struggling to fight in jungles and on remote islands against an enemy who did not believe in surrender.

As we approach this wonderful Feast Day this year, on that 75th anniversary (another was dropped a few days later on Nagasaki) may we spare a thought for all who suffered and continue to suffer as a result of those events? Let 6th August be a day of mixed emotions - somehow that seems particularly appropriate for this year when Covid 19 stalks the earth - make it special. Dawn Crouch

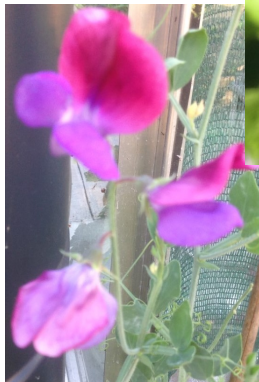
