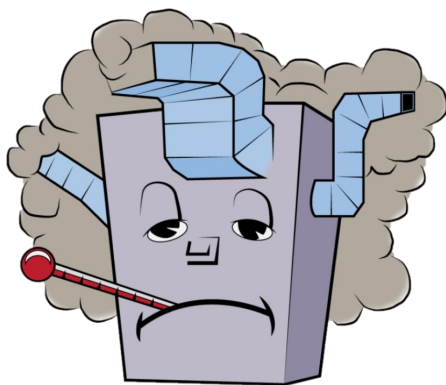

Dear friends,

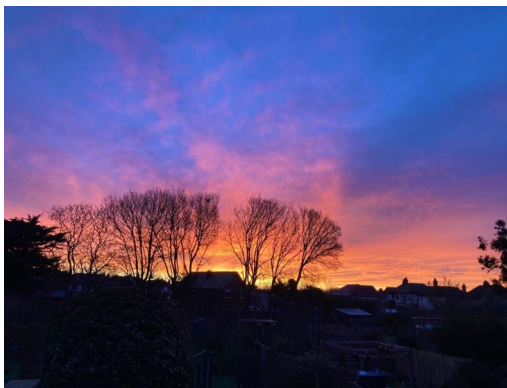
It's hard to see in the dark, though followers of Winterwatch were reminded last week by Chris Packham that, after a short period (about 15 minutes) our eyes have adjusted so that we can make our way reasonable safely and after about 45 minutes, we are able to see clearly with our 'night vision'.

I have spent my childhood and as much of my adult life as I can muster, living in places with no street lights where it gets 'properly dark'. This, for me, is one of the experiences I've most missed over the past year and I wonder how many of you share this delight?

However, we've been living through a different kind of 'living in the dark' experience and this can bring us closer to God if we're able to let the darkness 'be there' and adjust our vision. Certainly, we've learnt this year that there's no point in trying to fight it- the dark is what it is- sometimes cloudy, sometimes noisy, often quiet and still. Occasionally, we're treated to glimpses of a great sky full of stars and maybe a shiny full moon in which case, as well as being enthralled by its beauty, we can also make out the shapes of trees and houses and perhaps gain a new perspective on our world.

It's noticeable that God's people have always spent time 'in the dark', whether in exile, such as we often read in the pages of the Old Testament or through catastrophes such as the current pandemic. As a Christian body, we accept that these times, though not welcome, are part of the journey of faith because God journeys with us through them. Candlemas falls at the very beginning of this month and reminds us that we are all called, in whatever way we can, to share the light of Christ in a dark world.

Glance back over January

One of the secrets of the Christian life is its hiddenness. Over the past few days, the readings have reminded us to be alert to the ways in which God is at work unseen, like seeds germinating. This is the image I have in my mind as I look back over this winter month and I am delighted to see snowdrops appearing in the garden. In church, then, “not much is happening” but underneath the surface, prayer and worship continue. We have seen more of our people come through the harrowing experience of Covid and have recognised that we can 'do something' in this instance: we can pray.

When we gather again in church, it will be, I hope, as a community which has rediscovered this essence of our faith. One of the most special examples of prayer this month has been the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity; this opportunity to meet and 'join up' has resulted in a hugely encouraging new beginning of our lives together as Christians Together in Westgate for this New Year. If you haven't touched base with these guided reflections from the Community of Grandchamp in Switzerland which we were privileged to lead from the Vicarage this year, do please have a look and allow yourself to be touched by the way God works often secretly in the depths of our hearts. Sixty thousand Jews were in Thessaloniki, Greece on the eve of the outbreak of World War II. A living and vibrant Jewish community. Most of the porters in the port of Thessaloniki were Jews. The port of Thessaloniki was even closed on Saturday. Great rabbis lived there too

It was on this glorious community that the Nazi terror brutally rose.

Hitler took Greece by storm to secure his southern wing before launching Operation Barbarossa and the offensive against Russia.

Out of 60,000 Thessaloniki Jews, about 50,000 were exterminated in Birkenau in a very short time.

Few survived.

Among the survivors were the Bourla family.

After the war in 1961 a son was born to the Burla family. And they named him Israel - Abraham. (Albert).

Albert grew up and studied veterinary medicine. He received his doctorate in reproductive biotechnology from the Aristotle University of Salonika Veterinary School.

At the age of 34 he moved to the United States. He married a Jewish woman named Miriam and had two children.

In the United States, Bourla was integrated into the medical industry. He progressed very quickly and joined the Pfizer company where he became 'Head of Global Vaccines'.

From there, the road is short for his appointment as CEO of Pfizer in 2019.

Throughout the year, Bourla led the company's efforts to find a vaccine for corona in super efforts.

The vaccine that will save the lives of millions of people around the world was led and pushed by a Jew. Son of Holocaust survivors. From Thessaloniki.

His vaccine will also reach Germany, where 1000s have died from Covid - the vaccine will also save lives there.

And this is why Israel became the first country to receive the vaccine.

News from St Saviour's Church of England School

I write this having just watched the Prime Minister inform Parliament that schools will not go back until at least 8th March. St. Saviour's has been open to approximately ninety children of Key Workers since 4th January. I do not know when schools will be open to all children but I assume children in exam years will be the first go back – Year 11 and 13. I suspect many children may not be returning to school until after Easter.

This term has been yet more of the slightly odd existence we got used to between March and July last year. Like most headteachers, I have spent my career telling parents not to take holiday in term time and only to keep children off school if they are seriously ill. I never dreamt I would be telling two thirds of our pupils they cannot attend school. Most children have missed something like twenty weeks of school in the last twelve months. Though children have been completing home learning tasks and taking part in live meetings with their teacher and class, it is no replacement for school.

Parents have been placed in a difficult position. Some families, who have the time, knowledge and resources have been confidently helping their children learn at home. Other families face massive challenges: they may be working at home full time themselves; they may not have any devices with which to access learning; they may not have the knowledge, skills and sheer resilience to encourage children to work for extended periods. I know some employers, in order to save their businesses no doubt, have put pressure on their staff to continue working and parents are forced to juggle work and childcare.

Children have lost hundreds of learning opportunities. A small number of children have also experienced a deterioration in their mental health or the mental or physical health of a close family member. In addition, children who were being monitored, in terms of their welfare, by schools and social workers are now 'off the radar' to some extent. I suspect significant numbers of children across the country will slip through the safeguarding net and come to emotional or physical harm as a result of this pandemic. Being stuck at home with a parent or carer who may be experiencing mental illness, addiction, domestic abuse, poverty or poor housing will leave its mark on some children.

Yet, the alternative is possibly even worse. Without a partial closure of schools, the

pandemic may have been even more out of control and claimed more than the 100,000 lives reported up to this week. As one parent, who suffers with a serious, ongoing illness – which made him extremely high risk put it, *'I would rather my son experience some distress about missing school than lose his dad.'* We had seven members of staff contract Covid 19 in one week before the end of term and fall ill over the Christmas holiday. Luckily none had to be admitted to hospital. I shudder to think what may have happened if this level of infection had spread to vulnerable parents. School closures were, in my opinion, long overdue.

My hopes are that the country can emerge from this pandemic with not too many more people losing their lives or long-term health and that children can start to catch-up on some of the learning they have lost in the last year. I was delighted to see the happiness on children's faces when they returned to school for the first time in September. I look forward to seeing that same joy when children are re-united with their friends later this year.

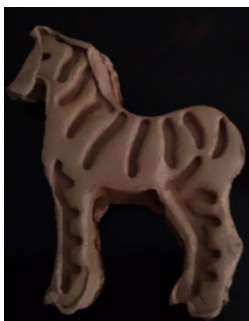

Ladies don't forget the rummage sale. It's a chance to get rid of those things not worth keeping around the house. Bring your husbands.

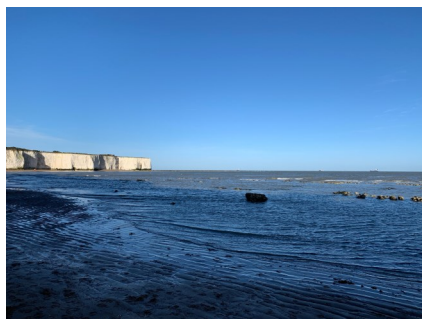

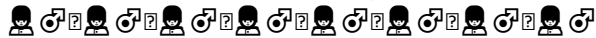

A grandson of Queen Victoria spends Easter at Westgate-on-Sea!



On 12th April. 1871, the Westgate-on-Sea railway station was opened. Without it, the town would never have been created. We learn from the late Dr. Dawn Crouch (Westgate On Sea-Fashionable Watering- Place-The First Thirty Years), that the town received many prominent visitors in the latter part of the 19th century, including Royalty. I am going to focus on one particular visiting member of the British Royal Family to Westgate-on-Sea, in my article this month:

Prince Christian Victor of Schleswig-Holstein:

Prince Christian Victor was born on 14th. April 1867 at Windsor Castle. His father was Prince Christian of Schleswig-Holstein, and his mother was Princess Helena of the United Kingdom, the third daughter of Queen Victoria and Prince Albert. His parents lived at Cumberland Lodge in Windsor Great Park, and Prince Christian Victor was considered a member of the British Royal Family.

Prince Christian Victor, his brother and his two sisters, were greatly loved by their parents, and passed golden childhoods virtually untouched by the horrors of industrial-age Britain. The children were also spoiled on frequent visits to their grandmother, Queen Victoria. However, Princess Helena made sure that her children were grounded in the realities of British medical and welfare work.

Prince Christian Victor became the first member of his family to go to school, rather than be educated by a tutor at home. He entered Wellington College, Berkshire, in 1881, which pleased his grandmother very much. Her late husband, the Prince Consort had helped to establish this school, many years before. (Her eldest son, Bertie, later King Edward the Seventh, had rejected his mother's advice to send his own sons to Wellington. They were taught at home by a tutor). Wellington School was built as a national monument to the first Duke of Wellington, Queen Victoria laying the foundation stone in 1856.

We learn from the late Dr. Dawn Crouch, that in April of 1882, Prince Christian Victor was lodging with his tutor at the seafront house on Sea Road, Westgate, of Dr. Harding. The house was called North Lawn, and was situated immediately west of Egbert Road, and next to Kimberley. Prince Christian Victor's 15th birthday fell on the 14th April, 1882. His father, Prince Christian, travelled on a special carriage attached to the train from London to visit his son on his birthday. Prince Christian was met at Westgate Station by Dr. Harding and Prince Christian Victor, and the party travelled on to North Lawn. I can only assume that Prince Christian Victor was on his Easter holiday from school, as Easter Sunday 1882, fell on the 9th April. It is also worth noting here that Easter was a very important religious festival to the people of Victorian England. People celebrated it with full zeal and enthusiasm, and visited their relatives and friends.

At Wellington College, Prince Christian Victor played for the college First Eleven in 1883, and was captain of the cricket team in 1885. In 1887, at the age of 20, he made a single first-class appearance in a fixture against Gentlemen of England. Prince Christian Victor remains to this day, the only member of the British Royal Family to play cricket at such a high level. He founded his own cricket team from 1885-1889.

In 1888, after leaving Sandhurst, the Prince became a British Army officer in the Kings Royal Rifle Corps. He participated in various campaigns and expeditions: India, North West Frontier, Ashanti Expedition, Reconquest of Sudan, and the Second Boer War. He was promoted to the rank of Major and was serving under Lord Kitchener in 1898, when British and Egyptian troops recovered the Sudan.

In 1899, the Prince served as a staff officer in the Second Boer War, and was involved in the relief of Ladysmith.

In South Africa in October 1900, whilst preparing to return to England, Prince Christian Victor came down with Malaria, just three weeks before he was to board ship. On 25th October, Lord Roberts, the Commander-in-Chief in South Africa, sent a telegram to Queen Victoria to advise her that her grandson was "seriously ill, but there are no complications and he has the best of nurses and doctors". However, five days later, a telegram from Pretoria informed Helena and Christian that their son was dead. Princess Helena broke the news to his grandmother, Queen Victoria. This shock to the Queen was a blow from which she never fully recovered.

Prince Christian Victor had come down with Malaria, and had died of enteric fever at the age of 33 on the 29th October. His request that, in the event of his death, his body should remain where he died along with his fellow soldiers, was duly honoured. On 1st November 1900, Prince Christian Victor was interred in the Pretoria Cemetery, his grave being marked with a granite cross and a cast-iron railing. Prince Francis of Teck was present at the burial, who was a brother of Queen Mary, wife of King George the fifth.

On the 2nd November, Princess Helena received her son's very last letter. It included his description in excited detail of the last cricket match in Pretoria in which he had participated. He told his mother that he wasn't feeling too good, as he had a fever, which he believed was brought on by the game and a mosquito bite. He thought that it was nothing to be worried about.

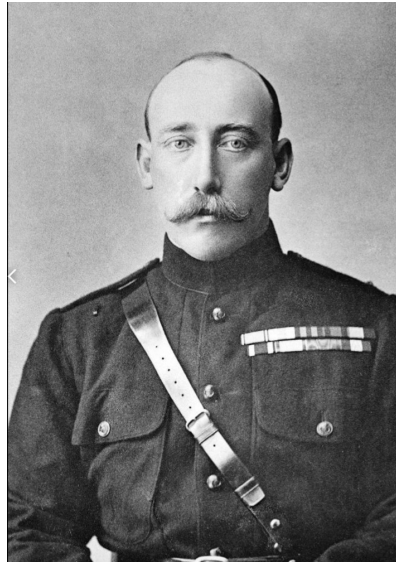
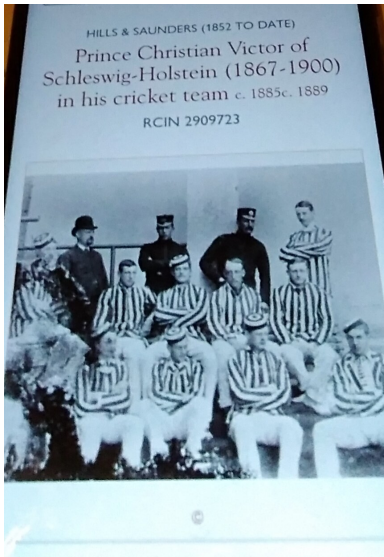
There are several monuments dedicated to the Prince:

1. There is a monument to him in the Chapel of the Crucifixion at Frogmore Mausoleum.
2. There is a monument located on Plymouth Hoe, dedicated to soldiers who lost their lives in the Boer War.
3. Friends of the Prince erected a statue to him outside Windsor Castle. The accompanying plaque displays his orders and campaign medals-"erected by his friends in

admiration of his qualities as a man and a soldier".

4. Finally, the Prince's parents dedicated a window to him in the Royal Chapel of All Saints in Windsor Great Park in 1905.

The schoolboy who had stayed at Westgate in 1882, had become a very popular young man, well liked and admired by everybody with whom he came into contact. He would have had undoubtedly, a glowing future in front of him.

St Saviours church , when myself and my sisters were children , was very busy . Rev H Pellet was vicar from 1955-1965 and he and his family led a strong congregation .It is nice to see this continuing , throughout the years , to the present day .

Mr Pellet was a kind and considerate man . He used to visit my mother ,unable to attend church because she had a lot of children to look after.

Mrs Pellet was a strong and lively woman very busy with church affairs . She used to sweep down the aisle on Sundays to the vicarage pew in the front wearing beautiful hats . She was very nice .I was quite in awe of her.

My sisters and I and friend Chris nee James used to attend Sunday school . Chris is still my best friend now . She remembers garden parties at the vicarage where we enjoyed a delicious tea and admired the beautiful garden .

Mrs Pellet and her daughter Jennifer , a ballerina , formed a group , St Saviours Junior Players, which was very popular .We put on shows at the church hall near Adrian square . In preparation for these we attended ballet lessons with Jennifer and drama .These shows were well attended.I have the programmes of these saved by my mother .

The first one was A Pageant of the Seasons in 1958 . We danced and sang .Hansel and Gretel followed then Golden Earrings and The Sleeping Beauty .I can still remember going to Mrs Martins house for fitting of my Sleeping Beauty costume . Her son Graham had a beautiful voice and sang solo s in the choir .

My sister Jen and I and Chris were confirmed at the church . Our mothers made us white taffeta dresses and we had to wear a veil . The bishop of Dover took the service. We were presented with prayer books.

A youth club was formed in the sixties and it was there Tony my husband and I first met.

Ann and Alan Clark remember Mr Pellet . He married them in 1961 .
