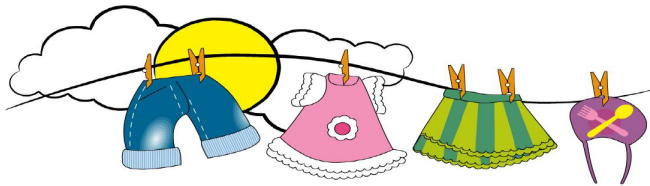

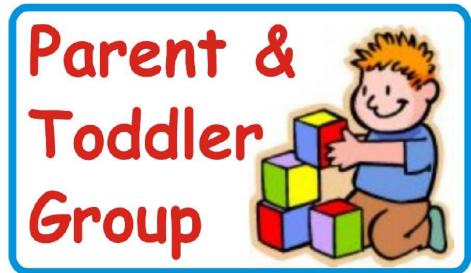
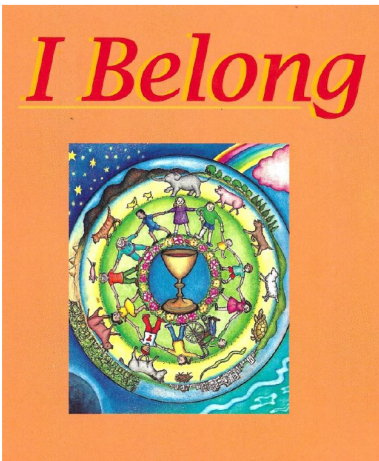

Annual Meetings

The Annual meeting of Parishioners will take place on Saturday 19th June at 10.30am in Church. This meeting is to elect two Churchwardens. Anyone who lives in the parish is invited to attend, and also all those on the electoral roll of the church.

This year, as Christine Attwood has served for more than six years as Churchwarden, the meeting will be asked to consider voting 'that the six year rule will not apply in this election for Churchwarden.' so that she can be elected again.

Due to changes in her personal circumstances, Chrissy Joiner has decided not to stand as Churchwarden for a 4th year.

This meeting will be followed immediately by the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) which is open to all those on the electoral roll. The first item on the agenda for the APCM is the election of people to serve on the PCC for up to 3 years.

Based on our Church Electoral Roll, we are entitled to 9 PCC members in addition to the ex officio members (2 churchwardens and Christine A and Christine B, who are our representatives to Deanery Synod). Graham Neve and Alan Clark were elected to the PCC for a 3-year term last year and we are delighted that Chrissy is willing to fill one of the remaining **7 places**. Please consider prayerfully whether you can offer to stand for election.

Nomination forms will be placed at the back of church and anyone interested should speak to Mother Karen, Christine A or Chrissy for more information.

The rest of the meeting involves hearing about the activities of our church since the APCM held last September.

## **News from St Saviour's Church of England School**

As we approach Whitsun, things are, very gradually, starting to get back to normal at St. Saviour's. Most importantly, there have been no year group closures due to Covid 19 so far this term. Children have had a consistent five weeks at school since the Easter break. I have just ended the mandatory wearing of masks by adults on the school site at drop-off and collection time. We have re-booked our visiting guitar teacher and already welcomed an external drama teacher into Year 3 and 4.

Teachers are still wearing masks in communal areas of the school. Children in each year group still play in segregated areas of the playground. Staff from different year groups do not mix and have separate staffrooms. All meetings are held online, this has led to a slight sense of dislocation among staff. Children are unable to mix with siblings or friends in other year groups. Consequently, school feels a little strange. Many children are still adjusting to being back at school and away from their parents – some have found this separation difficult.

Despite the challenges, anxieties about becoming ill and being admitted to hospital have begun to fade. Children, families and staff must be feeling a little safer. Children have got back into the habits of formal learning and routines have been re-established.

For the first time in over a year, our senior leadership team and I have been able to re-focus on learning. This may sound like a ridiculous statement from a headteacher but so much of the past year has centred around issues other than learning. Ensuring the safety of children, families and staff has definitely taken centre stage for me while teachers have carried on with the nuts and bolts of teaching. Learning has carried on because teachers are amazing but leaders at all schools have been preoccupied with Covid 19.

The process of re-adjusting to normality may take some time but the reward is seeing children settle into learning again. I have taught some lessons for the first time in a while, spending time with children as they learn has been blessed relief from interfacing with Public Health England. New displays of children's work are going up around school. We are starting to plan sports days and leavers ceremonies – returning to these routine tasks feels like a release!

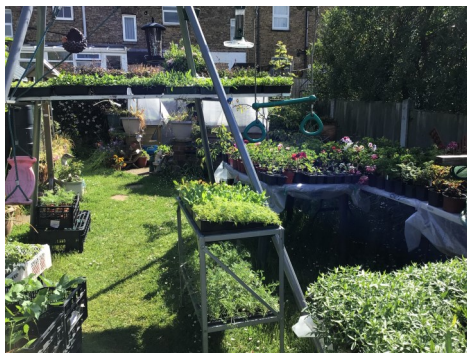

## **From the Parochial Church Council Minutes (PCC).....**

Meeting 19/04/21 (virtual meeting)

Minutes approved 23/05/21 (socially distanced meeting)

**Worship and mission.** Community room extension. All agreed to a meeting with interested parties and our architect in June 2021. Pantry in the porch. The PCC were disappointed that the whole stock had been taken from the porch during the time the church was open for private prayer. In future all porch doors would remain wide open during the time for private prayer and gates locked at 12.30 instead of 3pm. Clothes rail project. Rail to be collected. Authorising laity to administer Holy Communion. Again deferred to the next PCC meeting.

**Church heating.** A summary of the responses to the survey of the congregation and other users of the church building was provided. Also a report of the meeting held with the Sales Manager of Solray. A further meeting had been arranged for 27 April to include a heating surveyor. It was agreed to pay the heating surveyor direct rather than through a contract with Solray. All PCC members were asked to attend the meeting with the Diocesan Advisory Committee on 12 May 2021.

**Treasurer's report.** Finance. A statement of account for March 2021 was considered. Attention was drawn to the increasing deficit caused by the Coronavirus pandemic and the cost of lightning protection works, the installation of new sound equipment (speakers) and new cameras for live streaming. The bequest received from the estate of the Late Thelma Franks be deposited in the Legacy Fund. Roof repairs. It was hoped that the repairs would be completed in the next few weeks. Problems with ingress of water in the vestry window, vestry skylight and north aisle had been resolved. It was agreed to draw the problem of occasional ingress of snowflakes near the chancel to the attention of our inspecting architect.

**Churchwarden's report.** It was reported that the organ had been serviced, new Perspex screen installed on the hymn book cupboard, and ongoing problems with vestry locks and defective light bulbs in the south aisle. Quinquennial repairs. Work outstanding was noted. Work on the east window was the most urgent. Advice from our inspecting architect to be obtained.

**Safeguarding.** It was recommended that Disclosure and Barring Service checks were carried out on those acting as welcomers for private prayer.

**Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM).** The date for the meeting was fixed for 19 June 2021 at 10.30am in church. The terms of office for several representatives on the PCC come to an end at the forthcoming APCM.

**Fundraising.** Suggestions for orchestral concerts in August/September were discussed.

**Correspondence.** Details of funding by the Listed Places of Worship Grant scheme for 2021/22 had been received. A thank you letter from Porchlight had also been received. Details of an additional copyright licence were not considered necessary for current purposes.

 PRINCESS MARY'S GIFT FUND BOX
CHRISTMAS 1914

Princess Mary, the Princess Royal and Countess of Harewood, was a member of the British Royal Family. Born on 25th. April. 1897, she was the only daughter of the future King George V and Queen Mary. She was also an aunt of our present Queen, being King George VI's sister. In the First World War, she performed charity work in support of servicemen.

The Princess Mary Gift Fund Box was an embossed brass box that originally contained a variety of items such as tobacco and chocolate. It was intended as a Christmas present to those serving at Christmas in 1914, and it was paid for by a public fund backed by Princess Mary. The seventeen year old Princess Mary had originally wanted to pay for a personal gift to each soldier and sailor, out of her own allowance. This idea was not considered practical, and a proposal was made that she lend her name to a public fund which would raise the necessary monies to provide the gifts. The young princess took a deep, personal interest in the work of the Fund, and in a letter released by Buckingham Palace, she explained the purpose of the Fund. She signed off the letter with, "please, will you help me?"

It was assumed that the eligible recipients would receive an embossed brass box, one ounce of pipe tobacco, twenty cigarettes, a pipe, a tinder lighter, a Christmas card and a photo. However, many on the committee felt that other provisions should be made available to non-smokers. Their gifts in the box would consist of a khaki writing case containing pencil, paper, envelopes, the Christmas card and photograph. Nurses at the front in France, were offered the box, a packet of chocolate and a Christmas card.

However, there was a problem with the supply of the content items, and the committee solved the problem by hurriedly buying in an assortment of substitute gifts such as pencil cases, tobacco pouches, shaving brushes, combs, pencils and packets of postcards.

The fundraising effort proved a great success, and the total eventually subscribed, "amounted to £162, 591 12s & 5d, most of the money coming from ordinary people from all parts of the United Kingdom. The funding provided the manufacturing of small boxes made of silver for officers and brass for all other ranks. Each tin was decorated by an image of Princess Mary, and other military and imperial symbols. The boxes were intended for everybody "wearing the King's uniform on Christmas Day 1914" . Around 400,00 were delivered by Christmas, but the full distribution was not completed until 1920, by which time, approximately 2.5 million boxes had been delivered.

A Princess Mary Gift Box was a treasured possession of many veteran soldiers of the First World War, even when the original contents had long been used!

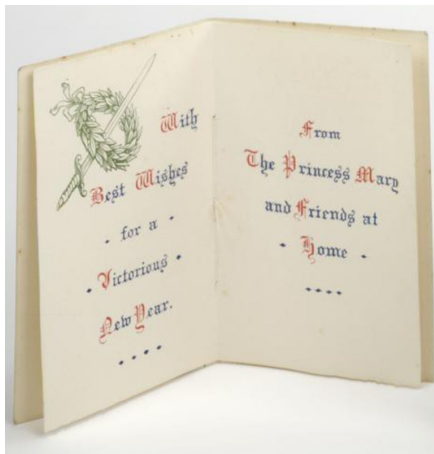
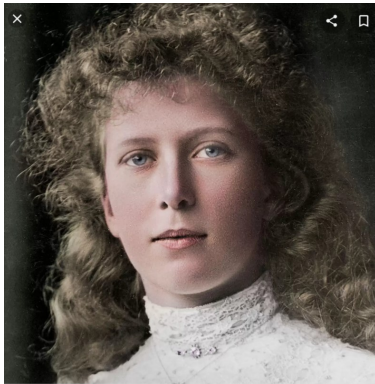
The boxes were air-tight, and many men used them as a container for money, tobacco, papers and photographs. Some men did not touch the gifts in their boxes, but carefully repacked the gifts and sent them home to their wives and families.

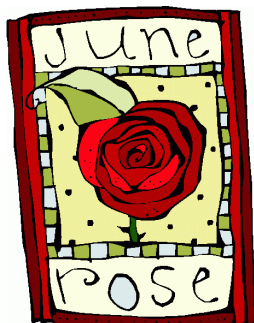

## "MARY OF EXETER- (A PIGEON) AWARDED THE DICKIN MEDAL"



Mary of Exeter was a carrier pigeon who flew many military missions with the National Pigeon Service, during the Second World War. She transported top secret messages across the English Channel, before flying back to her loft in Exeter. Mary was owned by Charlie Brewer, a boot maker from Exeter, who had become an intelligence agent during the war.

Mary completed many missions, but unfortunately, did not escape injury. She was wounded by enemy attacks on three occasions, but remained undaunted. Her stitches on these attacks amounted to 22: Her first enemy attack came in the form of an attack by hawks (birds of prey), at Pas-de-Calais. The Germans stationed there kept hawks, but Mary managed to return home with wounds to her neck and chest. She recovered from her ordeal, and was put back in service two months later. Her second enemy attack came in the form of a shooting. Mary returned across the English Channel with the tip of one of her wings shot off, and three pellets inside her body. She recovered, passed flight tests, and was returned to service with a shortened wing.

The last enemy attack, which was her final trip, saw Mary's neck muscles being damaged by shrapnel. Her owner made her a leather collar to hold her head up, and he took her out of service.

On her own home territory, Mary survived a Luftwaffe raid in 1942 in Exeter, when her pigeon loft was damaged, killing many pigeons housed there. Mary, however, survived.

Mary was awarded the Dickin Medal in November 1945 for showing endurance on war service despite her many injuries. Mary died in 1950, and is buried in the PDSA Animal Cemetery, Ilford, Essex. What a brave and determined pigeon Mary was!

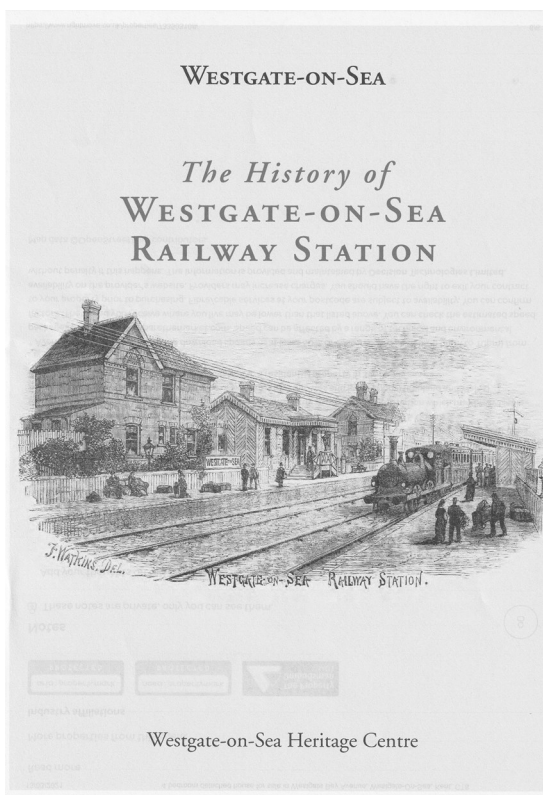

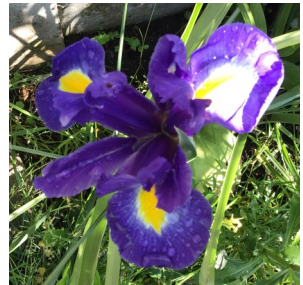
