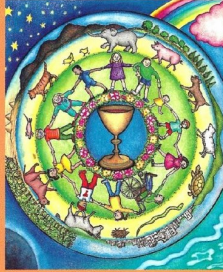

Dear friends,

So- we come to what for is for many people the high point and for many the low point of the year- the Christmas season. The month of December marks a New Year in church- a new retelling of the Christian gospel, beginning with the announcement and birth of the Child of Bethlehem. When we put up our new calendars on January 1st, the story is already well under way; the child is born and his parents will soon be fleeing for their lives as refugees to Egypt.

Christians, then, approach Christmas differently from people of other faiths and none. For us it's not simply about getting together and sharing good times with families and friends but a much deeper celebration of *God-with-us* Emmanuel.

This message of God's permanent presence through the ups and downs of life is at the heart of our faith. Without this assurance of solidarity with our human difficulties, struggles and failures as well as our joys and delights we would be on our own to puzzle life out. As it is, we're not- God is with us through it all.

This conviction enables us not to draw lines between what God is interested in and what he isn't; we know that every part of our lives matter to him. So- if we're in debt or in love, in poverty or feeling flush, grieving for a loved one or celebrating a new baby, struggling with a relationship or with desperate illness or thankful for our health, it matters to God who came to join us on earth in a stable rather than a proper home to show that he understands life from the inside.

God's message to us all year round is *I'm with you* but especially at Christmas, we're invited to take this seriously and ask ourselves what this means for us- how does it change the way we look at our lives? It should make all the difference between living with despair or living with hope but we can't do this on our own; we need the support of the community of God around us. God's Church is called to be his hands, feet, eyes and ears in the world and so we invite you once again- as over every Christmas and indeed every Sunday- to join us in experiencing more of God's love for us all as we meet as his people in his house.

May God bless you and all you love, care and pray for this Christmastide.

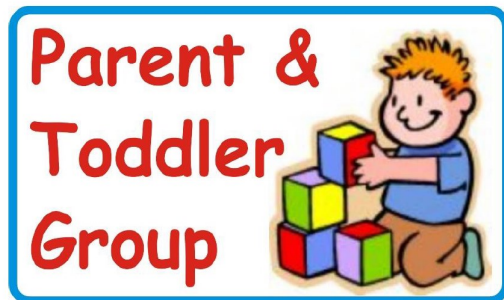

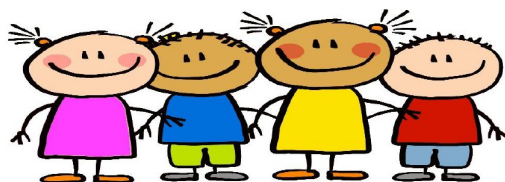

News from St Saviour's Church of England School

My news from St. Saviour's is relatively simple and short this month. The school has been given various additional chunks of funding by the Department for Education (as have all schools) to help children recover the learning lost during Covid-related school closures. I have spent the last few days in school working out how best to spend this extra money; in short, it is a nice problem to have.

As a staff team, we have gradually formed the view that we do not particularly like handing over our children to external tutors. Teachers want to address the gaps in children's knowledge themselves. Our teachers know which pieces of learning children missed and want to deliver learning activities to address those gaps. Luckily, with this additional funding, I have been able to either recruit additional staff or increase the hours of existing staff. We are going to use these additional hours of staff time to release teachers to work with small groups of children who have specific gaps.

This strategy sounds simple but the 'butterfly effect' is powerful in school. Putting in an additional teacher into Year 5 has meant the year group having to re-jig most of their lesson timings. Staff have had to change which groups are taught on which day and a whole host of other small changes to their working day. Again, this is a nice problem to have. I welcome the additional money. I am also incredibly grateful to have an immensely amenable and flexible staff team who are willing to reconfigure their working week to facilitate these additional teaching activities.

The gaps we see in children's learning are significant. This is the most daunting start to a school year I can recall. Thankfully, the government have recognised this and provided funding; I am thankful to have such capable staff members to begin the process of catching-up. I am also relieved to have the final two pieces of the puzzle – hard working children and supportive families. Having children work so hard in lessons and having parents so willing to go the extra mile to help their children will certainly help this cohort of children recover from the pandemic.

From the Parochial Church Council Minutes (PCC).....

Meeting 23/05/21, 9/6/21, 19/06/21, 19/07/21, 2/8/21 (virtual meeting) and 23/08/21

Minutes approved 04/10/21 (socially distanced meeting)

In view of the time elapsed between the meetings and approval of the minutes, only the meeting on 23 August minutes are detailed below. All earlier minutes have been superseded by events or reflected in other reports.

This meeting was arranged to consider the progress towards installing a new heating system in the church. The current position was summarised given the Church of England aim to be carbon neutral by 2030. Guidance issued by the Church Buildings Council was being followed. There was discussion regarding the viability of installing a hydrogen fuelled boiler, but as current trials are geared to the domestic market, it was considered inappropriate to go ahead with this option. The provision of radiant panels by Solray was the preferred solution and a meeting between their representative and E Saunders Electrical Contractors (who were being asked to quote for installing the necessary wiring to the electric panels) had been arranged. A further estimate for this work would also be requested from ACElectricals Ltd. It was considered that known costs could be met from existing resources and that the work qualified for refund of VAT under the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme. The heating of the Chancel/Sanctuary could not be provided by Solray due to limitations set down by the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC). Alternative solutions were being researched.

Meeting 04/10/21

Minutes approved 01/11/21 (virtual meeting)

Matters arising. Manual handling. The Health and Safety concerns regarding the moving of tables for outdoor refreshments has been resolved by the purchase of new lightweight folding tables. Appointment of Sidespersons. Deferred from meeting on 19 June 2021. Further postponement agreed in the prevailing circumstances.

Safeguarding. The policy statement was reviewed and signed before posting on the noticeboard in the porch. Training undertaken by Mother Karen had been almost completed, and advice was being sought from the Diocesan Safeguarding team regarding Disclosure and Barring Service checks and appropriate training for PCC members. Mother Karen was appointed as Safeguarding coordinator for children and Mrs Bolger reappointed as Safeguarding coordinator for adults. It was noted that in both children's groups all children were accompanied by parents.

Security. Smartwater. Last applied in 2012. The low level gutters and downpipes .

were now unprotected due to repainting in 2018/19. External security lighting was considered and earlier discussions with the police in 2014 were highlighted. At that time concern was expressed at the lack of lighting on the south side of the church, which had been overcome by the subsequent security lighting installed on the north wall of the Town Hall buildings.

Church heating. Estimate from ACElectricals received and considered reasonable. Project was on the agenda for the DAC meeting on 15 October. Heating unlikely to be installed before Christmas. It was also agreed to meet costs (£54k+) from reserves, not to fit thermostats to the panel heaters, include the heating of the chancel/sanctuary in the project, move the nave overhead heaters to the bell tower and meantime fund a new fan heater for the bell tower.

Worship and Mission. Community Hub. An updated statement of need was circulated for discussion at the next PCC meeting. Reports of discussions with the Westgate-on-Sea Town Council were made and that a steering group meeting would be held in the Town Council offices at 6.30pm on 27 October. Coronavirus. As it would no longer be possible to keep the west doors open during services due to the colder weather, the wearing of face masks while moving around and social distancing would be reintroduced. The need for further limitations and church opening times to be reviewed at the end of October.

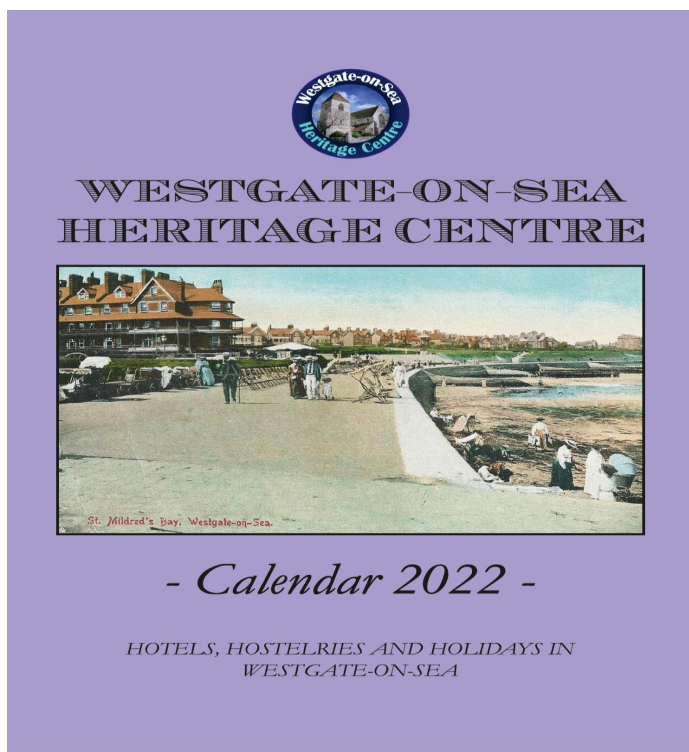
Treasurer's report. Statements for July and August were considered and explanations for variances in income explained. The settlement of the insurance claim for the roof repairs had distorted the position. Initial details of income/expenses for the Lark Ascending concert on 4 September were provided.

Churchwarden's report. Lighting. The Chancel lights had been replaced in August 2021, but an invoice for this work was still awaited. Lightning Protection. Decision not to test every year but defer until autumn 2023 and advise PTSG Electrical Services Ltd accordingly. Confirmed that no maintenance contract had been taken out. Pigeons. Problem with droppings outside north entrance had lessened so no further action needed.

Correspondence. Green Church showcase. Organisers advised that St Saviour's heating and Community hub project would not be featured. Westgate-on-Sea Town Council Neighbourhood Plan. Attention was drawn to the plan received and ongoing consultation.

Any Other Business. All Souls Commemoration. Names of those to be remembered and requests for lilies to be provided in advance of service on 31 October. Concerts. The piano recital by David Ruddock on 25 September had been much enjoyed and it was hoped to arrange further afternoon concerts for the coming months depending on the heating situation. Birchington Silver Band had been booked to play at the Christmas Fayre on 11 December. Christmas Fayre. Application to Thanet District Council for licence to run lottery (raffle) with 3-4 main prizes.

Revd A Way booked to provide recorded music in the grounds. St Saviour's School. Mother Karen will be entering the school twice weekly from November 2021. Grounds clearance. To take place on 16 and 23 October. Topbranch to cutback south side and St Mildred's Road side and clear site on 2 November. Cost £620. PA System. Meeting held with Kent PA Systems. Plan to get quality lapel and hand held mics and build up to a complete working system. Roll of Honour. The Roll positioned on the north wall had been damaged by damp. Attempts to repair the damage by Lovelys in Cliftonville were unsuccessful. Other alternatives to be pursued price

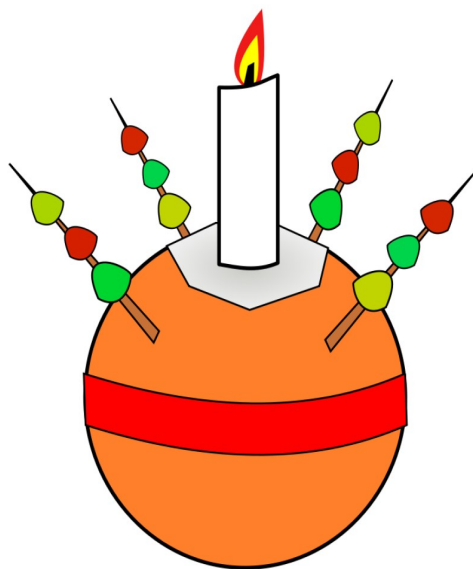

TWO POSTCARDS FROM MARGATE THROUGH THE YEARS:

1923 and 1973!



I have been looking through my picture postcard collection again, and have found two holiday postcards, reflecting the changing social history of the British seaside holidaymaker. Our two postcards were written fifty years apart, but from the same destination.

Our first postcard shows a view of the lower promenade at Westbrook. It was posted on the 23rd. May. 1923. On that day in 1923, the launch of Belgium's SABENA airline took place, with its first flight from Brussels to Lympe Airdrome in Kent. The stamp bears the younger image of King George V, and the postal cost was one penny. The writing on the card is in pencil, and it is written with a confident hand. I am under the impression that the writer is male. The writer uses Latin in his message, by writing: "tempus fugit" (time flies)! He is writing to "Debs", and signs off informally. He feels that his holiday is going quickly! The addressee is a Miss. Boughton, who is living at 28, Ashdown Street, Gospel Oak, London NW5. It would have been an affluent area. Gospel Oak is located on the southern edge of Hampstead Heath, and today, is a haven of period properties. I searched for the address, but sadly, Ashdown Street was demolished, and the street no longer exists. In its place, is a modern housing development. Bombing during the 1940's and post-war regeneration, affected Gospel Oak considerably. The former area around Ashdown Street, would be unrecognisable to Miss Boughton, today!

Our second postcard moves on fifty years, but we are still at the same resort of Margate. It is the 6th September. 1973, which was a Thursday. Richard Nixon was the president of the United States, and Edward Heath was the prime minister of the United Kingdom. It is postmarked "Thanet, Kent", and a postage stamp on that day cost two and a half pence. Four days later, the postage rate for a postcard increased to three pence!

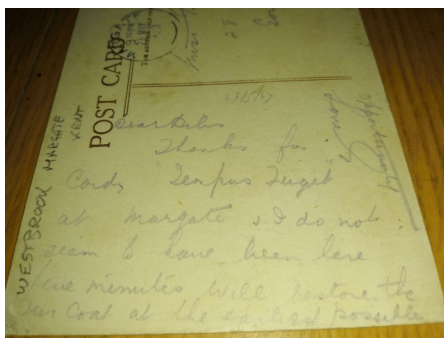
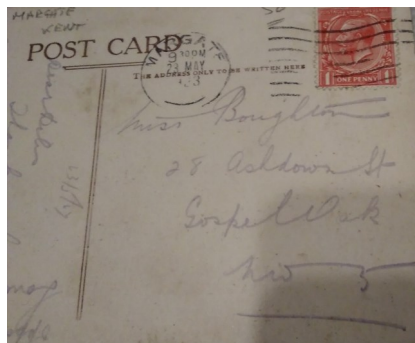
Reading through the lines, I am surmising that the writer of the postcard is enjoying maybe a group holiday at Margate for two weeks in September. There seems to be a party organised for the following evening which would have been a Friday. The addressees are a Mr and Mrs Tomlinson, and judging by the way the writer ends the postcard with "mum T", I would imagine that she is Mr. Tomlinson's mother.

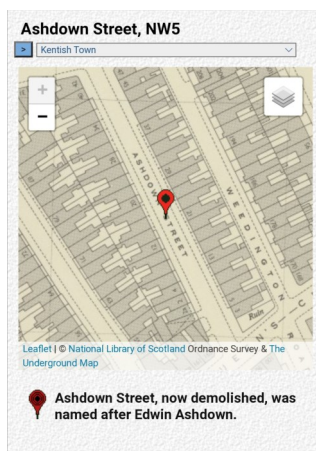
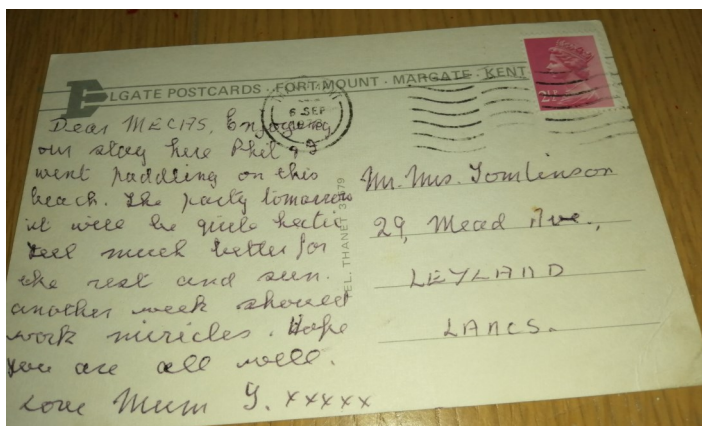
She uses capital letters in her greeting, presumably for the christian names in respect of each family member.

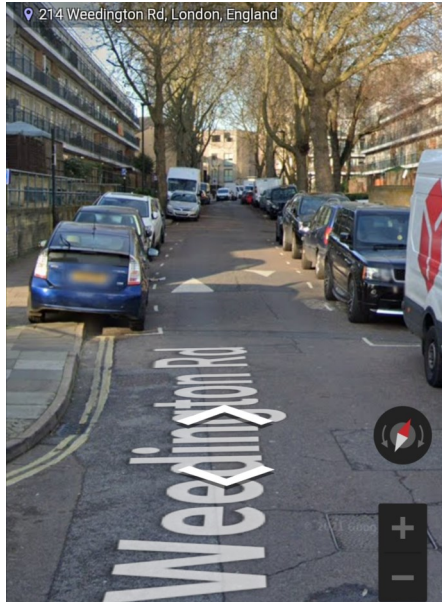
I researched the weather in Kent for the month of September 1973, and discovered that the month started off very warm, with a heatwave on the 9th, (Sunday) which led to 31° being reached at the weather station in Gillingham (Kent)!!! I wonder whether our writer's wish came true about the second week of her holiday working "miracles" for her health!

I hope that you have enjoyed reading this article as much I have enjoyed writing it! I have noticed a difference in the actual content of postcards from the 1920's and 1930's, in comparison to the 1970's and 1980's. The writers of the older postcards had a tendency to still be involved in domestic matters, despite being on holiday. Later writers predominantly concerned themselves with details of their holiday. As I wrote in my last article, postcards in the earlier part of the century were a form of social media, and the postal service was very reliable.

WILLIAM OF ORANGE-MALE WAR PIGEON-21ST RECIPIENT OF THE PDSA DICKIN MEDAL



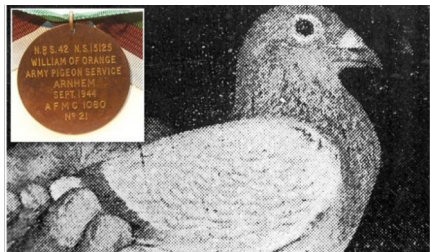
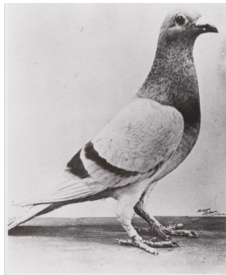
William of Orange was a male war pigeon of British military intelligence service MI 14, during the Second World War. William was trained by the National Pigeon Service, and he did his best, and way better than his best, in serving the army. Pigeons were usually used by soldiers at this time to deliver messages whenever radio communication wasn't enough. William was part of the Royal Corps of Signals, and as such, needed to prove his worthiness as a military pigeon.

It was during the Battle of Arnhem in September 1944, that William of Orange really proved his worth. Communications in that battle were a problem for the Allied units. German troops had surrounded the airborne forces. The paratroopers at Arnhem Bridge were in trouble and needed airborne support against the German soldiers. There were very few radio sets available, and those that were, malfunctioned. William of Orange was released by British soldiers at 10.30 am on the morning of the 19th September, 1944. Poor William of Orange flew over 250 miles, and the message he carried was one of the few to make their way back to the United Kingdom. He also flew whilst being rained upon by bullets from the German forces. Remarkably, he travelled across 135 miles of open water without any navigational guide. William arrived at his nest box in England at 14.55. If William had not have relayed the message, it could have immediately spelt defeat to the British army.

Because of his bravery in delivering his message, more than 2000 soldiers at the time of the Battle of Arnhem, were saved. For his courage and bravery, William of Orange received his Dickin Medal in May, 1945.

A friend and I were recently discussing the role that animals played in wartime. She had served in the Wrens many years ago in communications, and said that the relaying of messages, even in times of peace, was so important. What a courageous pigeon!
