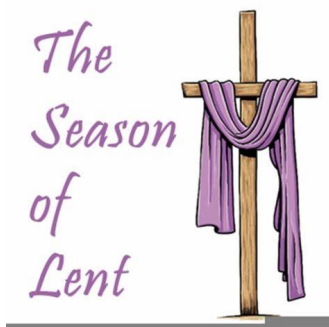

Christmas is now a distant memory. January, seemingly the longest month of the year has just passed and we are in February, the actual shortest month. Although this year of course, due to 2024 being a leap year there is an extra day.

The supermarkets have also put away their Christmas stuff and replaced it with the red hearts of Valentine's Day. We all know about the patron saint of love in whose name we send and receive cards, but just who was he? History records that there are three possible contenders, all of whom died for their faith under persecution from Roman Emperors. However, the St Valentine who was a priest and a physician is the most likely candidate. Sadly, he was arrested, beaten and eventually beheaded on 14th February AD 270.

Tradition suggests the martyr left behind a letter to a girl he had fallen in love with signed, 'your Valentine'. For this reason, the day St Valentine died has been dedicated to love. The Saint showed love for his Lord and His Church in refusing to give up his faith despite terrible punishment. In the Bible the New Testament first letter of John talks about love.

My beloved friends, let us continue to love each other since love comes from God. Everyone who loves is born of God and experiences a relationship with God. The person who refuses to love doesn't know the first thing about God, because God is love—so you can't know him if you don't love. This is how God showed his love for us: God sent his only Son into the world so we might live through him. This is the kind of love we are talking about (1 John 4 v 7-10)

Ash Wednesday this year also happens to fall on Valentines Day. This special day is when many Christians participate in a service where they receive an ash cross on their foreheads as an outward sign of being sorry for their failings.

Ash Wednesday, exactly 46 days before Easter Sunday, is the start of the period when Christians having repented of their sins, in some traditions, mark that solemnity by fasting ready to receive communion on Easter Sunday. It is known as the period of Lent. These days if people fast it is often by giving things up, such as sweets or biscuits.

In 2024 Ash Wednesday and St Valentine's Day fall on the same day; Love and sorrow for wrong do not seem to go together, but they do in the story of Easter. Whilst it is right for us to be sorry for our failings, the grace of God means we don't have to dress up in sackcloth and ashes in order to be forgiven. God loves us so much, that he sent his son to die instead of us. Jesus came back to life showing that God's love could not die.

So whether you have received a Valentine's card, or choose to give up something for Lent, please remember that God's love is there for everyone, including you.

Thanet Deanery Synod.

Debbie and I attended the Synod meeting on Thursday 23rd November 2023.

The purpose of this meeting was to present the Thanet Deanery Plan that had been under discussion and was now presented for approval.

There were three bold outcomes presented by the Diocese.

1. Doubling the number of children and young people in church.
2. To aim to have 200 new communities in the Diocese.
3. Every Parish, Benifice and Deanery to show signs of revitalisation.

There is a Church Revitalisation Trust and there is finance available for certain projects.

There are plans for a Resource Church possibly Holy Trinity Cliftonville and a bid for funding and a new incumbent is under discussion. This plan will be to revitalise the Margate churches.

There is now a Deanery champion for children and young people. This Rev Matt Hodder newly appointed to St Peter's Church. We have completed a questionnaire detailing which schools are in our Parish, how the church is involved and what support may be useful.

There are a number of plans detailed and if you would like to see it I can print it for you.

As the group has flourished and branched out it has become about much more than reading the books together. So sadly, this has led to us looking for somewhere where which has cooking facilities, where we can stay over lunch. To support this the group applied successfully for a small National Lottery grant which will fund these new activities.

What gift would you offer to Jesus?

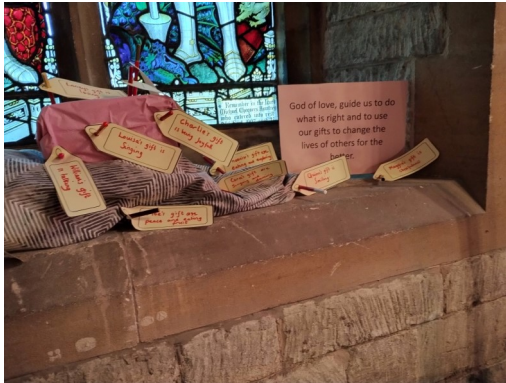
Each day we are going to remember this special prayer which we would like to share with you

Microwave Lemon Drizzle Cake

Ingredients

115g butter cubed 115g caster sugar
2 medium eggs 140 SR flour
1/4tsp baking powder Finely grated zest of 2 large lemons



For the lemon syrup topping

50g caster sugar Juice of 2 large lemons (about 75 ml)

Method

1. Lightly oil the inside of a 22cm silicone loaf tin and line with baking paper or use a non-stick liner.
2. Put the butter in a large microwaveable mixing bowl, cook uncovered on HIGH for 20 secs (1000W) (30 secs 800W) or until softened but not melted.
3. Add the sugar, eggs, flour, baking powder and lemon zest. Beat with a wooden spoon or electric mixer until well combined, thick and creamy.
4. Spoon into prepared mould and smooth the surface. Cook uncovered on high for 3 minutes 10 seconds on 1000W or 4 minutes on 800W, or until the cake is well risen and just firm to the touch.

Leave to cool for 30 minutes then lift out of the mould and place on a board.

5. To make the topping, set aside 1 and a 1/2 tsp of caster sugar and mix the remaining sugar with the lemon juice.

Pour the syrup slowly over the cake, no need to prick. Leave to soak for a few minutes, then sprinkle with the reserved sugar.

Leave to cool for at least an hour before serving.

News from St Saviour's Church of England School

In preparing to write this article, I checked my previous January pieces for The Link. I read my article from January 2021, which focussed on Covid. The article concerns the competing worries I was going through during the pandemic. On the one hand, I was concerned about vulnerable children, family members and staff contracting Covid and suffering complications. On the other I was worried about the hundreds of hours of missed learning time and also about children falling through gaps in the Child Protection system during school closures.

Despite the fact that we are three years on, those two fears and after-effects are still with us. I suspect we all know people who either died from Covid or are still experiencing some long-term health issues from the disease. We have two members of staff at St. Saviour's who still suffer with long term breathing / fatigue issues from Covid. The competing fears, about the safeguarding and educational effects of school closures, are also still relevant. Covid has affected schools and the health of their children in several ways.

The most marked negative legacy of the pandemic is on attainment. There was never any doubt that children missing school would leave in its wake huge gaps in learning. Our current Year 3 would have been starting Reception in September 2020. I am hopeful that they are possibly the last cohort we will see to have large gaps in their school history. This cohort missed a key, formative year of schooling, one where phonics and social skills are developed. The good news is that this cohort has seven years before they will sit their GCSEs and so, I hope will catch-up from the disruption.

Attendance and mental health have also suffered. Children and their parents were sometimes cut-off from the pastoral care that schools can provide. For a small number of families, an idea that school attendance is optional developed. Educationalists and policy makers have to accept that this is, in part, a consequence of school closures. Increased absence may also be an effect of poorer mental health provision for adults; NHS mental health provision has been reduced significantly since 2010. School attendance nationally is still far lower than in pre-pandemic years.

Though we are still dealing with these consequences, they no longer feel as acute or insurmountable. For most families, these effects are fading. This January has been perfectly normal; we have just got on with the business of teaching and learning. What's more, the one huge, positive effect of the pandemic is very much with us. Something analogous to the 'Blitz Spirit' developed during the pandemic at St. Saviour's – an increased trust between school and home. Family support for our work increased massively during the course of 2020 and 2021. Parents appreciated our efforts to support them and their children during a challenging period. I do not think we got everything right but families, broadly, thought we were doing the best we could in unprecedented circumstances. Perhaps periods of adversity really do bring out the best in a community? *Nick Bonell, Headteacher*

One of the many assignments of the Vergers Guild diploma, required me to make comparisons regarding the various translations of the bible which included versions printed throughout the centuries. That's quite a lot of bibles to choose from!

Where does one begin?

Tracey had received a bible at her Christening, and I had received a prayer book at mine - we were both Christened in the '60's.

In later life, I purchased a King James Bible which has some glorious text, however it just wasn't quite 'right' for me.

And that is the key, perhaps, to reading the bible.

You need to find a translation that's right for you. A bible is a very personal item and finding the right bible, is very much like buying a pair of shoes. You don't know if the fit is 'right' until you give it a try.

Good news, there is a bible suitable for everyone – including the Good News edition.

Therefore, if you are not engaging with your current copy of the bible, don't worry because there is a bible waiting for you. Keep exploring. Talk to friends and St Saviour's, until you find the right one. You will know when it's the perfect 'fit' for you.

There are currently 700 versions of the bible! To help, maybe start with these:

NRSV (New Revised Standard Edition) my personal favourite and current choice

GNB (Good News Bible) making the complex passages more readable

KJV (King James Bible) published in 1611

CEV (Contemporary English Version) designed for people who do not know Bible 'jargon'

The lake in Peasholm Park has a special event involving model battleships in the summer season. These models are replicas from WW2 period. It looks quite spectacular with lots of bangs and smoke!

The ships are not radio controlled as a man lies inside them and steers the vessel around the lake & fires its guns. The top part of the model lifts off so a man climbs aboard & then lies down & the detailed top section is replaced.

There are quite a few ships taking part but the one that amazed me was a submarine! Yes a man was inside as it dived below the surface only to pop up again on the other side of the lake.

They had model aircraft which slid down a guide wire stretched over the water to the island in the centre. They dropped little explosives which went off when hitting the water. Aircraft sounds came out of loud speakers too.

This event has been featured on a TV travel or holiday programme.

But come the day for me to return to Kent my motorcycle had no complaints as I strapped the shield (inside a dustbin bag) to the rear part of the seat & rested on the top box behind.

I kept a watchful eye in the mirrors to make sure it was still in place.

This shield has been hung on my wall wherever I have lived for over 30 years now & I will not part with it until the great bell in the sky tolls for me!

Changes to Canterbury Cathedral's Precincts Pass

Some members of our congregation recently found out that the Precincts Pass enabling free access to the Cathedral and grounds has been discontinued so many of us need to purchase its replacement, known as the Cathedral Pass. This costs £6 and is valid for five years. No discounts are available but children under 17 are not required to hold a ☐ pass and can visit free of charge with a Cathedral Pass-holding adult.

Please note no Pass or Visitor Ticket is necessary to attend services of worship in the Cathedral.

The new Pass can be held by anyone who;

Works in the old city of Canterbury ☐

Lives within 4 miles of Bell Harry tower, including ☐ within The Precincts ☐

Is a member of the Cathedral Congregation ☐

Is immediate family of a Cathedral staff member ☐

Is a Cathedral Volunteer ☐

Is a member of any church in the diocese (on the ☐ parish electoral roll or equivalent) ☐

If you are a Friend of Canterbury Cathedral, please see the last paragraph of this article. Otherwise please apply for a Pass online at www.canterbury-cathedral.org or call 01227 762862.

By signing up to the Cathedral's Pass holder mailing list, you will also be kept up to date with all the latest information on services, events and activities at the Cathedral, often before general release.

If you would prefer not to purchase a Cathedral Pass, a ticket can be purchased on the day of your visit at the Cathedral's Visitor Centre. The standard visitor ticket is valid for 12 months, meaning you can re-visit the Cathedral as often as you want during that time at no extra cost.

Canterbury Cathedral can also be supported via Friends of Canterbury Cathedral membership. This is available to anyone, regardless of location, and offers free visitor entry, a range of free or discounted events, and discounts in the Cathedral Shop and Lodge for an annual membership fee.
