Last month, prompted by St Valentine's Day I wrote about Love and Sorrow at the start of Lent. Looking at the calendar again I see that February this year has an extra day- 29th- a Thursday- we only see one of these every four years. The next one in 2028, will be on a Tuesday. All this is totally random information unless you are an horologist, someone who studies time. The church has a long-established connection with time in a way we might not expect.

In Europe, historians point to the role of the Church in encouraging the invention of time-keeping devices. Although the ancient Chinese and Egyptians invented sophisticated ways of measuring time, Christian communities, who prayed regularly according to the time of day, needed to know what the hour was. When there was no sun they only had inaccurate candles and sand timers. Hence their need for clocks.

Our Church calendar means we will celebrate this Easter Sunday on the last day of March and that from 1st March (St David's day) Lent has exactly 30 days to run. This includes Mothering Sunday, St Patrick's Day (another Sunday) and Palm Sunday.

So, what is Lent meaning to you? Have you given something up? Lent is a time of preparation for Easter. It goes back to the early Christians in the 4th Century who set out terms for fasting in the 40 days before Easter. In the Middle Ages things were extreme with no food at all until 3.00 in the afternoon and then no meat products, dairy or eggs were permitted. However weak beer was allowed, because water was often polluted.

That Lent should last for 40 days was supposedly because many of the well-known fasts recorded in the Bible lasted 40 days. This includes the time that Jesus spent in the wilderness when we read He was tempted by the Devil.

It seems that the desire to fast, or to give something up, is to prove we can stand up to and not give in to temptation. Of course none of us is perfect. I have given up eating sweets during Lent, but I still may succumb to a mint, or a piece of chocolate. More seriously there are occasions when resisting temptation has not been possible and often that may come in a failure to do something, or in the way I have hurt someone by doing or saying the wrong thing. Some of us carry even deeper scars that feel unforgivable. We should not beat ourselves up if this is getting us down, as the reality of God's promises can help. In the first letter of John at the end of the New Testament it says in Chapter 1...

If we claim that we're free of sin, we're only fooling ourselves. A claim like that is errant nonsense. On the other hand, if we admit our sins—simply come clean about them—God won't let us down; he'll be true to himself. He'll forgive our sins and purge us of all wrongdoing. If we claim that we've never sinned, we out-and-out contradict God—make a liar out of him. A claim like that only shows off our ignorance of God. (verses 8-10 The Message)

May I wish you happiness and joy as you reflect on the Good News of Easter and the understanding that Jesus died and rose again so that our failures (sins) are forgiven and evil can be overcome.

Please contact me if reading this has brought back to the surface something that is bothering you.

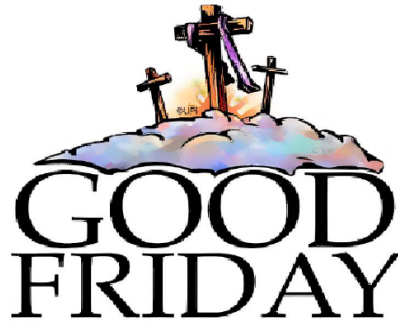

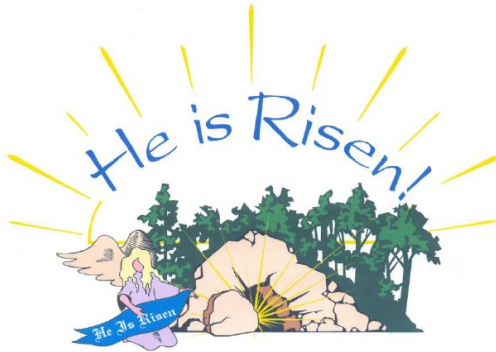

TIME TO RETREAT

I wonder if anyone reading this has been on a retreat? I know I have!

My experience came about through some friends of mine (who I shall refer to as Janet & Dave) which I knew for many years. In fact they let me stay in their spare room while I was arranging to move from Birchington to Westgate.

Janet used to go off for a few weeks every year & Dave would say "Oh she's gone off on one of her retreats". I was non the wiser.

Then sadly Dave passed away & it was after this that Janet decided to sell up & move to the location of this Retreat, which was situated in Somerset.

We kept in touch by post & phone & when I was going through a bad patch in my life she invited me to visit for a week as a guest of the Retreat.

It was situated in lovely countryside with views of fields & woodland & an apple orchard. There were no screeching seagulls to spoil the sound of tweeting birds! Janet now lived in a little cottage at this complex of buildings which had a Chapel & a Hall/Reception area as well as accommodation & dining room.

As far as I remember the Chapel held four services a day – 7.30am – 12noon- 6pm & 11pm.

I attended a few of them but as I was a guest I wasn't expected to go to all of them.

Also in the Hall they had meetings where you sat in a circle. A speaker would then invite anybody to stand & talk about whatever was on their minds (I never did).

Meal times I found most awkward as nobody was allowed to talk. Not that you should try talking while chewing on a hot chip!, but you couldn't even ask somebody to pass the salt or water jug. And the sound of knives & forks clattering on plates seemed to be amplified. My sense of humour could imagine Ronnie Barker making an amusing TV sketch from this. Once the meal was over & we left the room people started talking again.

The room I stayed in was nice if sparse with NO TV! In fact I never saw a TV anywhere so I never saw any news reports for a week!

Janet's cottage was compact. You couldn't swing half a cat let alone a whole one in the front room. Perhaps that was a reason why she let me have several items of furniture before she moved (which I still use) but it certainly was a chocolate box image from the outside.

We went out in her car on trips to visit places such as Wells Cathedral which was most impressive. You just stand and look in wonder at all the stone carvings. Also I was most taken with the clock which has two knight figures which move as the clock strikes the hours.

Nearby is the Bishop's Palace which has a moat and for years swans go up to the gatehouse and ring a bell by pulling on a cord to be fed. It didn't happen while I was there but I've it on a TV programme.

We also visited Cheddar Gorge which again was impressive but I was disappointed not to be able to reach up and grab great lumps of cheddar.

The only cheese available was in the Gift shop at highly inflated prices! Meanwhile back at the Retreat there was a possible job opportunity which Janet had recommended me for. It involved kitchen assistant work and gardening work, both of which I was used to. Accommodation was also provided with the job, but could I live in that environment full time?

I had a lot to think about on my way home & the following days. I wasn't really sure, so I declined the kind offer.

I kept in contact with Janet up until I was informed that she had passed away in 2021.

And if I had moved to Somerset I wouldn't be scribbling for "The Link!

And with that in mind I thank you for your time.

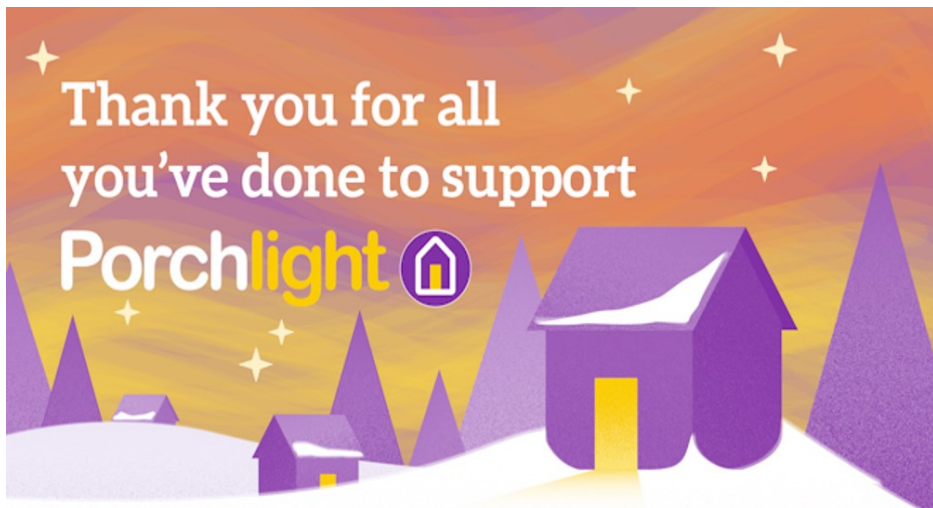

News from St Saviour's Church of England School

Mr Tift, our Sports Coach is currently drumming-up interest for the approaching Thanet Schools Cross Country race at Quex park in just over a week's time. We have huge numbers of Year Three and Four children racing and just need to encourage a few more Year Five and Six children to brave the cold. Running the cross country is hard. I am not a natural runner so admire the resilience it takes for young children to run over a kilometre. Even though most children are breathless and exhausted when they finish the race, the sense of achievement they experience is enormous.

St. Saviour's is always keen to encourage as many children as possible to engage in sport, music and art as much as they can. Sports teachers might be tempted to focus their efforts on the 'sporty' children when they are choosing children for sports teams and inter-school tournaments. Mr Tift and Mr Bailey before him, try hard to include the less keen children so they can face challenges, experience success and take pride in working for a team.

We have the same approach with music. Mrs Anderson, our amazing music teacher, works hard to recruit children for music activities who might not necessarily be high fliers in other subjects. St. Saviour's uses pupil premium funding to pay for instrument lessons for children who otherwise would not get to learn an instrument. We also target children for this intervention where attendance on certain days might be an issue.

Up until 2019, schools were principally judged by OFSTED by their SATS results in Reading, Writing and Maths. This undoubtedly caused school to focus on these subjects. Just as hospitals put more resources into waiting time-target driven areas, schools put more effort into accountability measures. When school leaders can potentially lose their job due to a poor inspection, this is understandable. I support primary schools in prioritising English and maths; these are the skills which will get children through their secondary education. However, the wider curriculum, including sports, music and art can build resilience, creativity, team work and problem-solving skills. These skills stand children in good stead as they progress through school into adulthood. We also need to accept that not all children are going to be excellent at maths and English. For some children, being great at sports or the creative arts, might be the one thing they can experience that really builds their self-esteem. Thankfully, OFSTED have now changed their approach and take a much keener interest in the wider curriculum schools offer.

For the above reasons, I fully support our teachers in 'persuading' children to take part in a variety of challenges and activities as they make their way through our school.

Mary Jones and her Bible

In the Cambridge University Library there is a bible with some handwriting inside the front cover. It reads:

Mary Jones was born 16th of December 1784.

I bought this in the 16th year of my age. I am daughter of Jacob Jones and Mary Jones his wife. The Lord may give me grace. Amen.

Mary Jones was from a poor family, the daughter of a weaver, who lived at Llanfihangel-y-Pennant, Abergynolwyn (today part of the Snowdonia National Park in Wales). Born in December 1784, her parents were devout methodists, and Mary became a Christian by her own choosing at the age of eight.

Mary went to a school organised by Thomas Charles, who was a methodist clergyman. Thomas had begun teaching children in his home to read and write but soon he had more children than space would allow! Thomas knew the philanthropist William Wilberforce and others, so with financial support, Thomas set up local schools in Wales. First, one man was trained by Thomas himself, then that person would be sent to a town or village for six months, where he taught the children and young people reading and Christian principles. So popular was the idea, that towns across Wales benefited.

It became Mary's burning desire to possess a Bible of her own however there were no bibles available to purchase in her town. In fact, anyone wishing to buy a Welsh Bible in the 18th Century would have found it very difficult. In November 1802 Thomas travelled to London.

In London, Thomas visited his friends who were ready to discuss a solution to the problem of a lack of bibles. The name of their new Society, whose sole object would be to supply Bibles was...the British and Foreign Bible Society. Today we know this society as the Bible Society www.biblesociety.org.uk.

But what about Mary?

Mary wanted her own Bible and having saved sufficient funds, she needed to find a retailer. And who was Mary's nearest stockist...Thomas Charles in the town of Bala, just 26 miles away.

Mary made that journey, on foot. Just take a moment to think about that. Walking 26 miles (that's roughly Westgate-on-Sea to Teynham, near Sittingbourne). According to the internet, that's a 9 hour and 44 minutes walk, just to get there.

You've then got the walk home, holding your bible. According to history, Mary was bare footed!

Treasure your bible and if it's a bit dusty, give it an airing and enjoy the marvellous content it holds.

RECIPE FOR MILLIONAIRE'S FLAPJACKS

Ingredients

150g unsalted butter 300g rolled oats 140g light brown soft sugar

4 tbsp golden syrup 1 tbsp maple syrup, or a total of 5 tbsp golden syrup

Caramel Layer:- 387 tin condensed milk 100g unsalted butter 100 g soft brown sugar

Chocolate Topping:-

200g dark chocolate - I used Sainsbury's cook's chocolate

Method 1. Heat oven to 160c fan. Butter a 20cm square baking tin and line with parchment. Tip the oats into a heat proof bowl.

Melt the butter, sugar and syrups in a pan set over a low heat. When the sugar has dissolved, stir well, bubble briefly and pour over the oats, stir to fully coat then scrape into the tin, pressing down into an even layer. Bake for 20mins until just starting to brown. Leave to cool slightly.

2. For the caramel layer* - warm the condensed milk, butter and sugar over a low heat, stirring with a spatula until the butter has melted. Turn the heat up to medium and simmer for 8/10 mins stirring continuously until the mixture has thickened and turned light brown. Pour the caramel over the base and smooth the surface. Leave to set at room temperature for 1 hour.

3. Melt the chocolate either in a microwave or in a bowl over a pan of simmering water. Pour the melted chocolate over the caramel layer. Leave to set at room temperature for 2/3 hours. Once set, lift the Flapjacks from the tin and cut into squares.*To save time, tins of caramel can be found on the shelf with condensed milk.

Changes to Canterbury Cathedral's Precincts Pass

Some members of our congregation recently found out that the Precincts Pass enabling free access to the Cathedral and grounds has been discontinued so many of us need to purchase its replacement, known as the Cathedral Pass. This costs £6 and is valid for five years. No discounts are available but children under 17 are not required to hold a ☐ pass and can visit free of charge with a Cathedral Pass-holding adult.

Please note no Pass or Visitor Ticket is necessary to attend services of worship in the Cathedral.

The new Pass can be held by anyone who;

Works in the old city of Canterbury ☐

Lives within 4 miles of Bell Harry tower, including ☐ within The Precincts ☐

Is a member of the Cathedral Congregation ☐

Is immediate family of a Cathedral staff member ☐

Is a Cathedral Volunteer ☐

Is a member of any church in the diocese (on the ☐ parish electoral roll or equivalent) ☐

If you are a Friend of Canterbury Cathedral, please see the last paragraph of this article. Otherwise please apply for a Pass online at www.canterbury-cathedral.org or call 01227 762862.

By signing up to the Cathedral's Pass holder mailing list, you will also be kept up to date with all the latest information on services, events and activities at the Cathedral, often before general release.

If you would prefer not to purchase a Cathedral Pass, a ticket can be purchased on the day of your visit at the Cathedral's Visitor Centre. The standard visitor ticket is valid for 12 months, meaning you can re-visit the Cathedral as often as you want during that time at no extra cost.

Canterbury Cathedral can also be supported via Friends of Canterbury Cathedral membership. This is available to anyone, regardless of location, and offers free visitor entry, a range of free or discounted events, and discounts in the Cathedral Shop and Lodge for an annual membership fee.
