The Solstice has passed, and we are nearer to the end of the year than the beginning, but the days are still full of light and the sun is hot as we look forward to the summer holidays at the end of this month.

The amazing shoots of growth seen in Springtime are now replaced by new seasonal foliage and blooms. July is a time to enjoy English Strawberries, locally grown tomatoes and burgers cooked outside on the barbecue, while our local beaches fill with holidaymakers drawn by the allure of sand between their toes and a chance to top-up on the naturally occurring vitamin D. Summer music festivals such as Glastonbury, Wilderness or Tramlines offer total immersion in sound and rhythm and lightshows during sultry evenings.

Seasonal times are depicted in the Bible, particularly in the Old Testament, with Summer as a time of abundance and provision. Remember the Ark? When Noah and his family came out on to dry land, Noah heard God give him a promise "While the earth remains, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night shall never cease." We understand this to be God's promise to humankind with summer highlighted as a period of warmth and growth.

We have heard the saying 'make hay while the sun shines' This is a paraphrase of an Old Testament verse..."He who gathers in summer is a wise son, but he who sleeps during harvest is a disgraceful son." (Proverbs 10 verse 5)

Jesus said, "Now learn this lesson from the fig tree: As soon as its branches become tender and sprout leaves, you know that summer is near." (Matthew 24:32) The disciples of Jesus were curious about God, the world and everything. Many followers were young people who were attracted to the things Jesus did that were outside normal human experience, healings, casting out demons, feeding thousands.

Today's younger generation are also interested in things that cannot be scientifically explained. A recent report highlighted findings that Gen Z- those born between 1997 and 2012- are interested in spiritual things and are less likely to be atheists than their parents and grandparents. This generation is the first truly 'digital' generation who have never known a time when the internet did not exist.

These survey findings were highlighted in the 'Belief in Britain' report which was based on the responses from 10,000 people aged between 18 and 24; it found that 62 per cent of them said they are "very" or "fairly" spiritual and many shy away from organised religion. Recently I was delighted to meet a person who told me they were a 'born again' Christian and had found faith online, but yet did not come to church.

Gen Z embraces the sensory spirituality of the Summer Solstice, the sheer overwhelming beauty of summer sunsets or the companionship of like-minded festival goers and there are plenty of online blogs, vlogs, and podcasts to sustain their spirituality without them ever having to set foot inside church. Yet this is a generation who have doubts and questions.

Last week I went to hear about the organisation that works in Ramsgate called 'Community Pastors' who spend their Saturday nights being a respected presence on the streets to assist those who have drunk too much or taken drugs. A pair of flip flops, a bottle of water or a sweet all go some way to helping them. What is more the pastors offer a listening ear. Without preaching or any attempt to evangelise the Pastors represent Jesus to many who are of this 'Gen Z' grouping.

This generation is not well represented in our church, but yet they are someone's children or grandchildren. Their sense of openness to spiritual things ought to give us common ground to bridge the generational divide. I wonder whether our focus on the church as an institution rather than talking about Jesus is what keeps us apart.

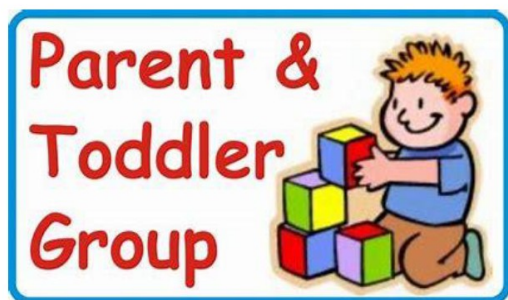

Mavis's Cookies

This is a "retro" recipe – so no grams, only pounds and ounces!

Ingredients

3ozs butter
3ozs white sugar
3ozs brown sugar
6ozs SR flour
1 egg
1 tsp vanilla essence
Pinch of salt
2ozs chopped walnuts or flaked almonds
4ozs chocolate chips

Method

Line baking tins and set your oven 350F or 180C.

1. Cream butter, sugar and vanilla till fluffy, beat in egg.
2. Fold in the flour, then the nuts and chocolate chips.
3. Drop spoonful's of the mixture onto the lined baking tray.
4. Bake for 12/15 minutes. Cool on the tray for 10 minutes before transferring to a rack

“TIN FOIL AND A FANTAIL FLASHER”

I have had a request – or at least a suggestion that I put into print how I saved the life of a fish. This was when I had several fish tanks with tropical fish. There were 2 tanks on a stand that was situated in front of a fireplace (unused) & I had removed the lid of the lower tank to clean the filter. Then I heard a splish splash sound so I looked to see if the fish were okay but one fish was missing! A Tinfoil barb had jumped out, not to the left or right or to the front – it had leapt out at the back & was now floundering in the dusty fireplace.

It was a job to reach it between the 2 fishtanks but eventually I grabbed it, put it into a bowl of water to rinse off the dust. The fish lay motionless with no movement from its mouth, I rinsed it again but thought it to be dead. Then I do not know what inspired me but I put my fingers around its head & I squeezed lightly, this caused its mouth to open & shut each time I squeezed. I did this for a minute or so but once I stopped the mouth no longer opened & shut & still no movement from its body or fins. I tried twice more in desperation & then when I let go the fish continued to open & close its mouth. After a while there was movement, the fish was alive ! I let it slowly recover then gently put it back into the fish tank, it swam about in a drunken manner but by the next day all was well. I was glad as a Tinfoil Barb as the name suggests is sparkling silver with some red & black markings on its fins so looks impressive.

It was when I had to move house twice in the 1990s that I stopped keeping tropical fish but I retained 1 fish tank to which I decided to keep a couple of goldfish, I would name them Splish, Splash & Splosh! They lived for about 15 years until time caught up with them & I replaced them with a younger Splish & Splosh. All was well until around November 2024 when Splish developed an internal problem – some form of growth but all the time it could swim & eat food I let it be. By the end of December it was spending a lot of time just resting on the gravel, surprisingly Splosh started resting beside the sick fish as if to keep it company. In the first week of January 2025 I found the fish floating on the surface, I buried it in a flower bed where daffodils bloom .

Over the next few weeks Splosh looked lonely & would spend most of the time looking fed up! So I went off to find a new fish friend, the shop didn't have any basic goldfish they only had fancy varieties. I chose a Fantail – these have 3 fins – it is a vivid orange colour & looks quite flash. It didn't seem upset by the bus journey to its new home. Once released into the fishtank it hid in a corner or behind some stones, it would venture out to eat food & swim. It certainly woke old Splosh up! Whose this flash fish in my domain he gurgled? After 2 weeks both fish were brave enough to face each other in the middle of the tank then shoot off in opposite directions. Now a few months have passed they seem to have got used to each other, sometimes having a mad moment chasing each other, they both seem happy. The pictures show each of the fish.

Changes to Canterbury Cathedral's Precincts Pass

Some members of our congregation recently found out that the Precincts Pass enabling free access to the Cathedral and grounds has been discontinued so many of us need to purchase its replacement, known as the Cathedral Pass. This costs £6 and is valid for five years. No discounts are available but children under 17 are not required to hold a ☐ pass and can visit free of charge with a Cathedral Pass-holding adult.

Please note no Pass or Visitor Ticket is necessary to attend services of worship in the Cathedral.

The new Pass can be held by anyone who;

Works in the old city of Canterbury ☐

Lives within 4 miles of Bell Harry tower, including ☐ within The Precincts ☐

Is a member of the Cathedral Congregation ☐

Is immediate family of a Cathedral staff member ☐

Is a Cathedral Volunteer ☐

Is a member of any church in the diocese (on the ☐ parish electoral roll or equivalent) ☐

If you are a Friend of Canterbury Cathedral, please see the last paragraph of this article. Otherwise please apply for a Pass online at www.canterbury-cathedral.org or call 01227 762862.

By signing up to the Cathedral's Pass holder mailing list, you will also be kept up to date with all the latest information on services, events and activities at the Cathedral, often before general release.

If you would prefer not to purchase a Cathedral Pass, a ticket can be purchased on the day of your visit at the Cathedral's Visitor Centre. The standard visitor ticket is valid for 12 months, meaning you can re-visit the Cathedral as often as you want during that time at no extra cost.

Canterbury Cathedral can also be supported via Friends of Canterbury Cathedral membership. This is available to anyone, regardless of location, and offers free visitor entry, a range of free or discounted events, and discounts in the Cathedral Shop and Lodge for an annual membership fee. Guidance on the Distribution of Holy Communion

March 2025

The normal practice for the distribution of the bread and wine of Holy Communion in the Church of England has, since the reformation, been for both bread and wine to be consumed by each communicant and for wine to be distributed from a common cup.

From time to time there have been situations in which advice or instruction has been given to suspend the use of the common cup in a health emergency and following public health advice. Two examples of this this century have been the outbreak of “Swine ‘Flu” in the 2000s and, more significantly, the COVID-19 pandemic in the early 2020s. Many churches across the Diocese of Canterbury have not resumed the normal practice of distributing Holy Communion after the pandemic.

Since 2022 there have been no restrictions on the use of the common cup and on communion in both kinds. The House of Bishops’ COVID-19 Recovery Group’s advice states that

*Holy Communion should be administered in both kinds unless there is a clear and objective reason why there would be a significant risk in doing so, such as local public health warnings relating to coronavirus levels in your area. It is important that no pressure is placed on members of the congregation to receive the sacrament if they feel unable to do so. **Because of ongoing potential risks to health, an individual communicant may choose to receive only in the form of bread even if consecrated wine is being distributed.***

Therefore, normal practice should now be considered to be for Holy Communion to be distributed in both kinds (bread and wine) and that the common cup be used. Incumbents and Parochial Church Councils of churches where the common cup has not been reintroduced are encouraged to consider its reintroduction and that the normative practice of the Church of England be resumed across the Diocese. The use of individual glasses or cups for individual communicants remains unlawful.

Public health and good hygiene remain important. Therefore

- Those who feel unable to receive the common cup may receive Holy Communion in one kind (bread) only.
- Individual communicants may not dip the bread into the wine (intinction) themselves.
- Care should continue to be taken by those presiding at Holy Communion to maintain high levels of hygiene, including hand washing.
- Those who show symptoms of illness should take steps to minimise their contact with others, including at Holy Communion.
- In cases of particular need, individual communicants may request the minister to dip the bread in the wine (intinction) before giving it to the communicant. **However, this is the exception rather than the norm.**
- PCCs may continue to make local arrangements for how any greeting is organised at the Peace in services of Holy Communion.
