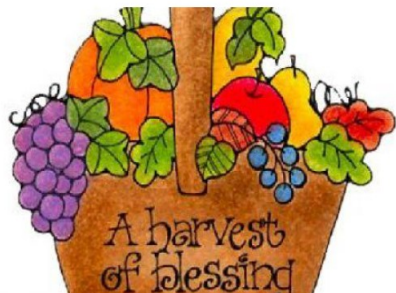

I spend quite a bit of time in my car driving along the main roads in Thanet. Recently it has not been possible to miss the numbers of St George's cross flags draped over footbridges and tied to lampposts.

According to the media this apparent outpouring of national pride is to make a point about how our heritage is being undermined by outsiders. For some the use of the flag and imagery of Christian crosses makes a statement about England (or is it the UK?) being a country that was great when everyone we all sang hymns and said the Lord's Prayer.

But why use a cross as a symbol to make such a point, as the ancient Romans used a cross to horribly execute the worst criminals or escaped slaves. It was designed as a spectacle to torture and humiliate. The memory of the horror of crucifixion is preserved in our English word *excruciating* which we take to mean as very painful, but it comes from the Latin words meaning to crucify.

It may surprise some, but there was confusion in the early church as to whether the original cross was either a T shape or the shape that we see today. This arose from the different ways that the Romans used this nasty method of execution. There were, however, two things that were consistent; the *Stauros* that is the Greek word for the crosspiece and the post on which it was nailed that was dug into the ground. Jesus was forced to carry the wooden *Stauros*, weighing about 35 kg, out of the city after he had been so savagely beaten and whipped.

The cross that we now recognize as the one on which Jesus died, represents the ultimate in sacrifice. It is not to be turned sideways and painted red. Any attempt to fuse the standards of Christianity with the ideals of nationalism, or the belief that God has bestowed a unique privilege and responsibility upon a particular country to represent him, is wrong. That way represents the opposite of Christian generosity and love – sadly, the proliferation of the St Georges Cross suggests exclusion and hatred of the other.

Probably the most well-known Bible verse is from John's Gospel chapter 3 verse 16, however the verse that comes after it says ... *God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.*

So, there is no condemnation or exclusion in the Church that we serve. All of us can be accepted by God, regardless of who we are because Jesus was raised up on a cross. God sent his Son into the world and all we must do is come and look at him.

'For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life'

News from St Saviour's Church of England School

Though the torrential rain is dampening spirits a little, our new Year 3 children have settled in very happily. We have completed three weeks of term and all children have got to know their new teachers. We were very pleased to welcome some new members of support staff this term, including a new Premises Officer. We are preparing to say goodbye to Mr Dave Jordan, our long-serving Premises Officer, who is retiring.

Support staff are the unsung heroes in schools, contributing to the development of children in a variety of ways. Our premises staff, including cleaners, ensure that children work in a safe, clean environment. Our catering staff keep everyone fed and nourished. Our amazing office staff never stop juggling a multitude of tasks which keep the school and its finances running smoothly. Finally, our classroom-based teaching assistants and Family Liaison Officer support children and their families on a daily basis. These staff allow teachers to do their job by tackling barriers to learning – they are an incredibly valuable resource.

I was reminded of the value of some of the work we do with families when I bumped into a parent of a child who left us last academic year. As well as missing the social ties between parents at the school gate, the parent said how much she had come to value the support of our Family Liaison Officer. The mum had been supported with free uniform, benefits help, parenting advice and generally a shoulder to cry on. I am sure secondary schools offer the same support but parents tend to have less face contact with school staff after primary school.

The pastoral support our children and families receive helps our school continue to be a place of calm for children. Our bible verse, Jesus Calms the Storm, sums up what we want St. Saviour's to be for children. Not only does a calm environment make for good learning, it also offers children a place of refuge from the storms of life. Many of our children face hardship, poverty and conflict outside school, we want our school to be a place where children can leave their troubles behind and flourish as future citizens.

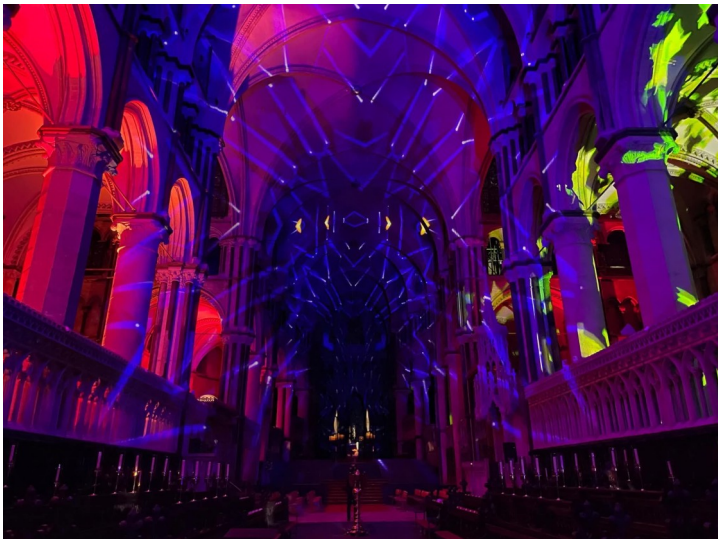

Peanut Butter and Choc Chip Cookies (Air Fryer recipe)

Ingredients

125g peanut butter
100g light brown sugar
1 egg
1/2 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp vanilla extract
59g plain flour
100g choc chips



Method

1. Beat peanut butter, sugar, egg and vanilla until smooth, stir in flour and baking powder to make a soft dough, then fold in choc chips.
2. Scoop out 12 spoonful's of the dough (weighing approx. 35g each). Roll into balls, flatten slightly, then place on a lined plate and chill in the fridge for 30 mins to firm.
3. Heat your air fryer to 180C, line the basket with baking paper. Place the cookies on the parchment leaving room to spread. Cool in batches for 7 to 8 minutes until brown. Leave in the air fryer for 3 minutes. Transfer to a wire rack.
4. My first batch were slightly over "brown"!! Still tasted good though.

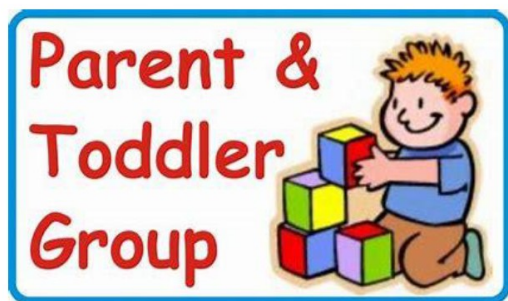

LOST FLOWERS, A CACTUS AND 3 PIPS

Over 40 years ago I decided to reply to an advert which was in the window of our local village shop. Somebody wanted some help in their garden, so I was invited to have a look. The lawn was overgrown & I was taken to where the neglected lawnmower had been hibernating in a corner of the garage. After I brushed the cobwebs & dust from this red & green petrol powered monster I set to the tasks of removing the spark plug & then gave the starting cable a good pull. The engine turned over which was a good sign, I cleaned the carburettor & checked the fuel pipes. The cutting blades were cleaned & adjusted. With the spark plug refitted it was time to start the beast! Having pulled on the starter cable until my arm was about to fall off it was time to investigate further. Ah, perhaps I should tickle the carb? There is a little plunger that you push which primes the fuel intake & once your finger is wet with petrol all is well. Another trick is to warm the spark plug with the flame of a lighter, all quite safe among the petrol fumes all around! With a warm spark plug back in the cylinder head followed by vigorous tugs on the cable there was a cough & a splutter (from the engine not me!) the mower burst into life in a cloud of smoke which soon cleared. After adjusting the throttle this way & that I got some steady engine response. Then clicking the drive lever we hurtled across the lawn with the mower sounding like a cross between a powerboat & a Sopwith camel!

The mower was cutting quite well, only a few patches were too thick for the blades so I trimmed them down with shears. A couple of times the engine decided to stop for a rest! A few pulls of the cable coaxed it back to roaring life! I just had to finish off with the manicure set – an edging tool & long shears.

The next time I was invited back was to clear a rather overgrown area which had a crazy paving path (which you couldn't see leading to an old shed. The lady left me to it while she went shopping, there was a lot to cut down & trim back. After a few hours the path was now visible. All the cuttings I put into large sacks then gave the paving slabs a good brush with a stiff broom, I thought it all looked rather spiffing. On her return she stood looking at my handywork, there was a silence as I waited for some sort of praise. After a few minutes she suddenly said "What have you done with my flowers?" to be fair there wasn't any brightly coloured blooms visible so if I had cut down or dug up any potential flowers it was by mistake. While I can tell a rose from a daffodil I am not really familiar with flowering plants if they don't have a flower on them! All I could do was apologise for my mishap – at least she could now get to her shed! She never sent me off to set foot in her garden again but in future she would point out what should or shouldn't be cut down or removed plant wise. I had a love hate relationship with the lawn mower, it was either going to pull my arm out of its socket or I was going to kick it in the grass box!

Continuing my theme of plants I have never had much luck with house plants. In my experience once in my possession they can't wait to join that compost heap in

the sky! – apart from one! I was given a cactus as a gift over 25 years ago. It was about 8 inches high & reminded me of a cactus you see in wild west films. I put it in the corner of my kitchen & thought - well that wont last. Over the following months & years it kept growing upwards & outwards. Drastic action had to be taken when it reached the ceiling! Now I could cut a hole but I do not think the person living above would be too keen on a spiky cactus coming up through their floor, so amputation was the solution. In a few years it was ceiling time again so I cut it back again & it's still growing – its like an indoor tree! Which reminds me of apple trees – early this year I put some apple pips into the cactus pot just out of curiosity. 3 of them sprouted & grew, I put them into another pot. I gave one away to be planted in a garden. The other 2 are in a pot & are about 16 inches high & full of bright green leaves, how long will they last?

Getting back to the cactus I was surprised at how much milky liquid came out of the cuttings – could one drink it ? perhaps there could be fresh apple crumble with cactus milk by Christmas!

Homelessness Support in Thanet 2025-2026

Background

Prior to Covid, Thanet Churches played a pioneering (there was no provision before 2016) and developmental role in winter homeless support.

Government funding ("no one out" policy) direct to local authorities and regulation led to the cessation of most voluntary led (dormitory style) shelters.

In our area Thanet District Council (TDC) have run two static shelters (latterly in Cliftonville – 8 spaces) which, for health and safety reasons, must be vacated within the next two weeks.

Challenge

The replacement static shelter (former probation offices in Margate) will not be ready for many months (planning approval only granted last week.)

TDC night street count shows 20+ are street homeless. The proposed static shelter will have capacity for only 8.

The Salvation Army were asked if it could work with Thanet churches and resurrect a dormitory model to provide emergency accommodation from October to February 2026.

Solution

A local Ramsgate church has agreed to allowed full use of a building for this period. This will provide overnight accommodation and day time access to support services that will operate from the hall. The management of the shelter will be provided by TDC.

This is such an answer to prayer. Without this, people would have been on the street this winter. (except for SWEP periods)

Can you help?

The Salvation Army have been asked to **coordinate support in the shelter**. This will cover meal provision, bedding and laundry, sundries and fund raising.

The model that worked so well from 2016-2020 was a church taking responsibility for support each night.

Can we return to this?

Can your church provide food, cooks and helpers (befrienders) on a rota and give a Christian presence at the shelter. Seven churches on a rota would be ideal.

Volunteers would need to register with The Salvation Army to be allowed access to the shelter. Full training will be provided

The shelter will open 6 October 2025

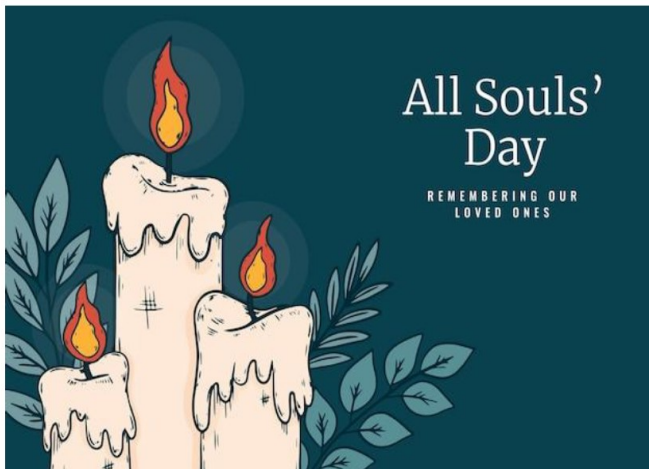

Changes to Canterbury Cathedral's Precincts Pass

Some members of our congregation recently found out that the Precincts Pass enabling free access to the Cathedral and grounds has been discontinued so many of us need to purchase its replacement, known as the Cathedral Pass. This costs £6 and is valid for five years. No discounts are available but children under 17 are not required to hold a ☐ pass and can visit free of charge with a Cathedral Pass-holding adult.

Please note no Pass or Visitor Ticket is necessary to attend services of worship in the Cathedral.

The new Pass can be held by anyone who;

Works in the old city of Canterbury ☐

Lives within 4 miles of Bell Harry tower, including ☐ within The Precincts ☐

Is a member of the Cathedral Congregation ☐

Is immediate family of a Cathedral staff member ☐

Is a Cathedral Volunteer ☐

Is a member of any church in the diocese (on the ☐ parish electoral roll or equivalent) ☐

If you are a Friend of Canterbury Cathedral, please see the last paragraph of this article. Otherwise please apply for a Pass online at www.canterbury-cathedral.org or call 01227 762862.

By signing up to the Cathedral's Pass holder mailing list, you will also be kept up to date with all the latest information on services, events and activities at the Cathedral, often before general release.

If you would prefer not to purchase a Cathedral Pass, a ticket can be purchased on the day of your visit at the Cathedral's Visitor Centre. The standard visitor ticket is valid for 12 months, meaning you can re-visit the Cathedral as often as you want during that time at no extra cost.

Canterbury Cathedral can also be supported via Friends of Canterbury Cathedral membership. This is available to anyone, regardless of location, and offers free visitor entry, a range of free or discounted events, and discounts in the Cathedral Shop and Lodge for an annual membership fee. Guidance on the Distribution of Holy Communion

March 2025

The normal practice for the distribution of the bread and wine of Holy Communion in the Church of England has, since the reformation, been for both bread and wine to be consumed by each communicant and for wine to be distributed from a common cup.

From time to time there have been situations in which advice or instruction has been given to suspend the use of the common cup in a health emergency and following public health advice. Two examples of this this century have been the outbreak of “Swine ‘Flu” in the 2000s and, more significantly, the COVID-19 pandemic in the early 2020s. Many churches across the Diocese of Canterbury have not resumed the normal practice of distributing Holy Communion after the pandemic.

Since 2022 there have been no restrictions on the use of the common cup and on communion in both kinds. The House of Bishops’ COVID-19 Recovery Group’s advice states that

*Holy Communion should be administered in both kinds unless there is a clear and objective reason why there would be a significant risk in doing so, such as local public health warnings relating to coronavirus levels in your area. It is important that no pressure is placed on members of the congregation to receive the sacrament if they feel unable to do so. **Because of ongoing potential risks to health, an individual communicant may choose to receive only in the form of bread even if consecrated wine is being distributed.***

Therefore, normal practice should now be considered to be for Holy Communion to be distributed in both kinds (bread and wine) and that the common cup be used. Incumbents and Parochial Church Councils of churches where the common cup has not been reintroduced are encouraged to consider its reintroduction and that the normative practice of the Church of England be resumed across the Diocese. The use of individual glasses or cups for individual communicants remains unlawful.

Public health and good hygiene remain important. Therefore

- Those who feel unable to receive the common cup may receive Holy Communion in one kind (bread) only.
- Individual communicants may not dip the bread into the wine (intinction) themselves.
- Care should continue to be taken by those presiding at Holy Communion to maintain high levels of hygiene, including hand washing.
- Those who show symptoms of illness should take steps to minimise their contact with others, including at Holy Communion.
- In cases of particular need, individual communicants may request the minister to dip the bread in the wine (intinction) before giving it to the communicant. **However, this is the exception rather than the norm.**
- PCCs may continue to make local arrangements for how any greeting is organised at the Peace in services of Holy Communion.
